Pasture update for producers

The Glen Innes Research and Advisory Station will be the venue for a Pasture Update next Wednesday March 22nd. Producers from across the Northern Tablelands for are encouraged to attend this event which will connect producers with current industry and researchers.

Key note speaker is Richard Simpson, a Senior Research Scientist with CSIRO's Agriculture Flagship, an initiative that brings together research in agricultural productivity and environment sustainability. Richard is based in Canberra and leads a national research team assessing the feasibility of developing pastures that are highly productive but with lower phosphorus fertiliser costs.

Richard will address one of the key farm inputs for Northern Tablelands producers, the use phosphorus fertilizers. Find out how current industry research can be applied on your farm.

The Pasture Update will feature morning presentations from a number of other speakers including Brad Walmsley, NSW DPI; Jessira Perovic, MLA; Tom Amey, Chair of the MLA's Northern Region Southern Australia Meat Research Council and Matt Benham, New England Weeds Authority.

The afternoon will feature concurrent sessions held onsite at the Research Station and will include the use of drones on farms; inspection of current legume trials and live cattle assessment. In addition, we will have a range of displays from commercial providers and event partners for attendees to view.

The day's program will start at 9:00am but tea and coffee will be available from 8:00am and participants are encouraged to arrive early to make the most of the information available on the day. The cost is \$20 and includes morning tea and lunch. Register on-line by Friday 17th March 2017.

Rebates doubled to make quad bikes safer

THE State Government has doubled the value of rebates available to farmers for quad bike safety measures. Last July the government introduced one-off rebates to allow farmers to buy helmets and safety equipment, undertake training, or upgrade their quadbike to a safer side-by side. farmers \$1,000 for the purchase of a side-by-side, \$500 to fit an existing quad bike with safety equipment, and \$90 to purchase an approved helmet.

Farmers are also now able to apply for two rebates, to cover properties with multiple vehicles. Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that everyone should treat quad bikes with caution.

"Each injury or death has a tremendous impact on the regional community. Safety upgrades are an easy way to avoid heartbreak, and now they're easier to access than ever."

A new, 12-minute, online quad bike safety presentation (www.safework.nsw.gov.au) has also been launched to give farmers easy access to important information. To qualify for the rebates, farmers are required to complete the online course, do a quad bike safety course, or interact with a SafeWork NSW officer. That can be as easy as a short conversation at a field day.

Rebates under the quad bike program are administered by NSW Farmers Association.

Decision on fees and charges postponed

A review of Fees & Charges for Regulatory Services has been postponed.

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) had proposed to adopt a single-fee approach to align costs charged by the two former council areas prior to the merger.

The revised fees and charges for the Planning and Environment Department were placed on public exhibition with the original deadline for submissions set as February 22, which was extended until March 22.

This has now been postponed and will now be reviewed when the council's broader annual review of all Fees and Charges go on Public Exhibition later in the year.

The Guyra ANTY group led

the charge to encourage awareness of the changes, which they say would have resulted in around 60 new fees for those in the former Guyra Shire area.

In a statement released last week, they have thanked Simon Murray for 'his persistence to have the format of fees and charges for the ARC adjusted to reflect the changes applicable to both Armidale Dumaresq Council and Guyra Shire Council.'

ARC have withdrawn the draft policy from their website, however they say that all feedback collected from the community has been recorded and will be reviewed when the council's broader annual review of all Fees and Charges go on Public Exhibition along with the 2018/2019 Budget in May 2017.

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Weekly Market Report

Guyra weekly sheep and lamb market report Wednesday March 8. There was a good quality yarding with a good supply of trade weight lambs along with good numbers of ideal stores. There were very few heavy weight lambs penned and no extra heavy weights. All the regular buyers were in attendance and operating.

Light weight lambs to the processors were firm with the 12-18kg 2 scores selling from \$62 to \$100/head. **Trade lambs** were firm to \$3 dearer with the trade weight new season lambs selling from \$108 to \$154/head to average between 580c and 630c/kg cwt. **Trade weight old lambs** sold

from \$115 to \$142/head. **Trade** weight Merino lambs sold from \$105 to \$114/head. Heavy weight lambs were firm to \$3 cheaper with the over 22kg 4 scores selling from \$147 to \$167/head. **Store** lambs were \$3 dearer with the restockers paying to \$119 and hoggets sold to \$130/head.

Most grades were represented in a mixed yarding of mutton. **Ewes** were \$4 to \$6/head cheaper and more in places while the wethers were close to firm. 2 score ewes sold from \$26 to \$85 while the better 3 and 4 scores sold from \$75 to \$114 for Merinos and \$120/head for crossbreds. Merino wethers sold to \$125/head.
