Fresh start for Spuds?

A group of local footy supporters is taking steps to see senior rugby league make a return to Guyra next year.

After a long history of being one of the dominant teams in Group 19, the last few years has seen the team come and go from the senior ranks.

With no local team, Guyra players have been forced to look elsewhere. Several were part of the Bundarra Bears team who took out this year's Group 4 second division grand final while others, including the League Tag players, played for Armidale and other nearby towns.

A meeting is being organized to gauge support to get the team back on the paddock in 2018. They want to see a 'back to basics' approach to the game with local blokes playing for their home-town with the support of the community.

The informal meeting will be held at the Guyra Hotel (Bottom Pub) on October 4th, starting at 6.30pm to gauge interest from supporters and players.

They hope this will be a fresh start for the Spuds, but need a good roll up to see it come to fruition.

Michael Wilson is one of those who is keen to get the Super Spuds back on the paddock, with hopes of fielding one men's team and a League Tag side next year in the second division competition.

"If the town wants to see footy back in Guyra then we need to start planning now," he said.

"There's plenty of interest from players but getting a committee will be the hardest thing. The numbers are there, but we need support off the field as well."

"Anyone who is interested in getting senior league up and going again come along to the Bottom Pub and throw your two bobs worth in."

They hope to build on the strength of Guyra Junior Rugby League which has been so successful the last four or five years.

Mick Shiner coached the under 12s this year and said it is disappointing to run out of pathways for the kids once they get to 14s or 16s.

"It's important for the town and the community to get senior league happening so the kids have those pathways," he said.

"Seeing those older blokes playing and representing the town will give them someone to emulate - tradition and history are important."

If there is sufficient interest at the meeting on October 4th, they will call a formal meeting in the hope of forming a committee.

They will then be in a position to approach Group 19 and Group 4 with the view to competing in second division next

Ride for sick kids

Guyra Central School put on a warm welcome for cyclists participating in the Northern NSW 'Ride for Sick Kids' last week. Students from Kindergarten to Year 10 formed a guard of honour to welcome them to the school.

On the first leg of their journey from Inverell to Newcastle, the riders called in at the school on Tuesday afternoon. The Ride or Sick Kids is a fundraising cycling event that raises money for Ronald McDonald House programs in Northern NSW.

The ride has become a symbol of hope for the many families in the Northern NSW region with a seriously ill or injured child. The ride alternates routes each year to allow the riders to visit schools and involve the local communities throughout the region that Ronald McDonald House Northern NSW assists.

Among the team of 15 riders was a former student of the school Dave Munro. He is now a successful businessman and is the McDonald's Licensee of Nambucca Heads, Coffs Harbour and Grafton Stores. He is also on the board of the Ronald McDonald House Charities

Dave is regular on the rides and said that being a McDonald's owner/operator,

Since it began, the Ronald McDonald House Northern NSW Ride for Sick Kids has raised more than \$2.8 million and this year are working on taking the total over \$3M which will go towards Ronald McDonald Houses in Newcastle and Tamworth.

Focus on race for Mayor

Those taking a seat on council, in order of preference, are former administrator Ian Tiley, Debra O'Brien (Country Labor), Simon Murray, Margaret O'Connor (Team O'Connor), Jon Galletly, Dorothy Robinson (Greens), Libby Martin, Bradley Widders, Diane Gray, Andrew Murat and Peter Bailey.

Only three of those elected served on the previous Armidale/Dumaresq Guvra Shire Councils. Margaret O'Connor and Andrew Murat (ADC) and Simon Murray (GSC) will be the returning councillors, while Ian Tiley will bring experience to the team following his term as administrator and many years in other local government areas.

The focus will now turn to the first meeting of the new council which is scheduled for September 27. High on the agenda will be the election of Mayor and Deputy Mayor. So far Ian Tiley is the only councillor to confirm he will nominate for the position.

Have your say.....

We have every right to complain

Since Election Day I've heard and read numerous comments from certain quarters telling me and all Guyra people that we must now "move on" or that if we didn't vote we have "no right to complain".

Really? I'd say that under the wholly undemocratic circumstances in which we have been promised there would be no forced amalgamation, in which our voices have been ignored and in which the government appointed administrator has behaved in particularly dubious fashion, not only should we not shut up as some would wish, but we most definitely have every right to complain as loudly as we can.

I did not vote formally in this farce of an election. To do so felt to me like it would legitimise the circus we've been subjected to. The very notion that our democratic rights were being exercised after they had previously been completely refused was too ironic to stand.

Martin Luther King Jnr said that his people would not be satisfied until they were no longer denied the right to vote or no longer believed they had nothing to vote for.

The people of Guyra Shire have been denied the right the vote on amalgamation and have since been given nothing to vote for. At best we were only ever going to get one local elected, if that. One voice in 11 seems pretty pathetic compared to five on our own council.

My dad was general manager of that council for 20 years. He is dismayed now to discover the historically competent and viable council he knew has been thrown in the bin and replaced with a Frankenstein's monster built from the putrid corpse of the perennially incompetent and dysfunctional Armidale council.

In his time he and other Guyra people like Gilbert White, Ivil Reid and many other Shire presidents, mayors, councillors, council staff and residents fought for and achieved great things for Guyra like sealing Tingha and Ebor roads, building the pool and opening the Guyra preschool, to name only a few examples, and always while

maintaining fiscal prudence.

What will we get now? Millions have already been thrown around by the "administrator". Those millions will inevitably find their way to Armidale and there they will stay, including our rates.

I lived in Tamworth for 10 years and saw the Tamworth Regional Council take over and spend tens of millions on "regional" this and "regional" that - but always in Tamworth. Not in Manilla. Not in Barraba. Not in Nundle.

This is our future - unless something changes. Only continued and vigorous opposition to the criminal treatment of Guyra people will provide any real chance of that change occurring. So when people with a particular agenda say "move on" or tell us we have "no right to complain" tell them to go lie in the middle of the beautifully sealed Tingha Road.

We must not be satisfied until our legitimate discontent is heard and we get what was promised.

Weekly Wool Market Report

September 15th: Losses were recorded against nearly the entire offering this week. The falls were sharp on the first day of sales with 50-60 cent drops common across the board.

The second day of sales witnessed a consolidation in prices with only minor movements being recorded. The drop in prices was met by grower resistance with over 15% of the national offering passed in including figures of almost 20% of the fleece offering in the Southern and Western regions.

Exchange rates were not favourable this week with the Aussie dollar surging above 80 cents US for the first time in well over 2 years. Leaving the

market down a more modest 22 cents when looked at in US currency.36,121 bales were sold nationally for the week with the major buyers including Tianyu, PJ Morris and Seatech.

The trend of almost every sale this season having larger quantities on offer than the previous year's corresponding week looks set to continue for the short term at least. AWEX data is currently showing almost 30,000 additional bales have been offered nationally for the season to date compared to the same period last season.



Industry Wide Changes for Cattle & Sheep Producers

From the 1st October 2017 the new Livestock Production Assurance (LPA) program requirements will include on farm biosecurity and animal welfare practises.

You will need to renew your LPA accreditation every three years and to renew you will need to complete an assessment and pay a fee to renew your accreditation.

All accredited LPA producers will be receiving written correspondence from Integrity Systems, a subsidiary of Meat and Livestock Australia, in regards to these changes and key dates.

To help local livestock producers keep up to date with these changes GLENRAC will be hosting an information evening on Tuesday September 26th in Glen Innes.

This event will feature presentations from Livestock Biosecurity Network; Northern Tablelands Local Land Services and the Glen Innes Vet Hospital.

Topics covered will include the new requirements for the LPA, the Johne's Beef Assurance Score (JBAS) framework and what is required for farm biosecurity planning and how to carry out a farm biosecurity assessment.
