Accident on Ben Lomond range

Police are investigating a two-vehicle crash 20km south of Glen Innes on Monday.

Emergency services were called to Ben Lomond Range on the New England Highway, 5km south of Glencoe, about 12.15pm on Monday 2 October 2017, following reports a Holden Vectra and Mazda CX9 had collided.

A 35-year-old woman, who was the driver of Holden Vectra, was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics before being airlifted to John Hunter Hospital in a critical condition with head injuries.

Her passenger, a 12-yearold girl, was also treated at the scene for a broken collarbone, before being taken to Armidale Hospital.

The driver of the Mazda CX9, a 39-year-old man and his passenger, a 43-year-old woman, were assessed by paramedics for non-life threatening injuries. The woman was taken to John Hunter Hospital with a fractured sternum and the man was treated for a foot



injury

Four boys, aged six, 10, 13, 15, were treated at the scene before being taken to Armidale Hospital for a range of minor injuries, with the 13-year-old boy receiving a fractured pelvis.

Officers attached New England Local Area Command established a crime scene and commenced an investigation.

Murray defeats Tiley for Mayor

Simon Murray will lead Armidale Regional Council for two years, after being elected Mayor at Council's first meeting since the September 9th poll.

Councillor Murray only confirmed his nomination shortly before the meeting which was held at the Armidale council chambers last Wednesday. He beat former administrator Ian Tiley 7-4 in a closed ballot, after a motion for an open ballot was defeated.

There was a three way tussle for the position of Deputy Mayor with Peter Bailey and Margaret O'Connor beaten for the job after a last minute nomination by Dorothy Robinson

Cr Simon Murray brings with him three years experience as a Councillor of the former Guyra Shire Council and a determination to represent all residents of the Armidale Regional Council local government area. Cr Dorothy Robinson has served the community as a Councillor on the former Armidale Dumaresq Council and is keen to encourage sustainable and healthy growth for the region.

"I am grateful for the opportunity to represent the com-

munity as Mayor of Armidale Regional Council," Cr Murray said. "I would like to take this opportunity to thank Dr Ian Tiley for his hard work and commitment during his term as Administrator during the challenging process of amalgamation.

"I will work together with my fellow Councillors and Council staff to ensure our whole community has a voice in determining the future of our region."

Council confirmed a sched-

Meeting times were debated, with Armidale/Dumaresq having previously held theirs at 6pm, while Guyra had opted for morning meetings. After some discussion Councillors agreed to a compromise that will see meetings scheduled at 2pm.

Cr Murray confirmed his commitment to Tingha by moving that the scheduled December meeting take place in the town, following a practice of the former Guyra Shire. There were some objections to this move, however it was felt that this may be a good opportunity to gauge the true feeling of the Tingha community.

Council also unanimously endorsed an earlier decision by the administrator that the 2017/18 fees payable to councillors be set at the maximum of \$19,310 and also that the fees payable to the Mayor be set at the maximum of \$42,120.

Move to quarterly water meter read

Guyra residents will soon move to a quarterly water meter read to bring the town in line with NSW Government Best Practice Guidelines.

Currently customers in Guyra receive a half yearly water rates notice. The change to the water meter read will take effect from November 2017 and not impact

on the total amount paid for water throughout the year.

Armidale Regional Council's Group Leader Service Delivery Mark Piorkowski said smaller, more frequent payments, similar to other major utility providers would allow for better household budgeting.

"With more regular information made available on

water consumption patterns customers are able to better monitor and reduce their water usage," said Mr Piorkowski. "This in turn has a positive effect on the household budget."

Early detection of water leaks is also a benefit of a quarterly meter read.

"Occasionally faults occur in either internal plumbing or water appliances such as garden irrigation systems or toilets, that are hard to detect," said Mr Piorkowski.

"It usually takes a spike in the meter read for a property owner to be alerted to the issue. Quarterly meter reads lessen the impact of these types of faults and helps save precious drinking water."

SEPTEMBER 29th - It was a week of consolidation for the wool market with very little change across the board. 10-15 cent rises in selected Merino micron types were offset by 15-25 cent falls in most of the Crossbred types.

The Merino carding indicator at plus 29 cents was the standout performer for the week. A sharp fall in exchange rates led to the Aussie dollar dropping over 2% against the US compared to week's close. With the EMI when looked at in US dollars actually down 30 cents for the week. 36,406 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 8.2%

Major buyers included Tianyu, Seatech and Fox & Lillie. Data from AWEX show's half of the Merino Fleece on offer this week had a mid break percentage of 50 or greater. The discounts for these types are widening with the heavier vegetable matter types also remaining under pressure.

The forward market is also showing signs of consolidating with discounts to the current physical narrowing. Contracts for the 19 and 21 micron indicators have been changing hands at only 20 cents under the current physical until the end of the calendar year.

Guyra - where you could've made a small fortune over the last 3 years

While Sydney and Melbourne boomed over the last three years, one particular lesser-known location was also producing strong price growth plus the added bonus of being much kinder on the household budget than Sydney or Melbourne.

If instead of being transfixed on Australia's two most expensive cities, for one-third of the cost of a typical Sydney or Melbourne house, those same onlookers could have purchased a property three years ago that achieved price growth which exceeded most capital cities and had a better cash flow.

According to official data from CoreLogic, Guyra in New South Wales achieved comparable rates of growth to Sydney's blue-chip suburbs. Today's median house price in the Northern Tablelands township is an incredibly low \$280,000 after increasing by a whopping 50 per cent over the three years ending May 2017.

Relative to the rest of Australia, the money required to cover a deposit and acquisition costs to get in to the Guyra market is nominal, the annual holding costs barely touch the household budget, and the capital growth already achieved was superior to 95 per cent of Australia.

One of the biggest myths in real estate is that capital cities are the best investments. It always fascinates me how so many investors are oblivious to the opportunities throughout regional Australia where, generally speaking, it costs much less to enter the market, annual holding costs are lower, and potential for price growth can be superior to many high-profile cities.

The average annual change in median house price in Guyra since the turn of the century remains superior to all capital cities.


Most households can comfortably save \$100 per week so an annual holding cost of approximately \$5,000 per year for a property is well within an investor's budget. But, those who can afford more, I question the merits sinking more \$10,000 per year in to one property as opposed to spreading their investment capital over a couple of assets in completely different markets for a similar combined investment.

The learnings from this historical evidence is not to jump in and buy in locations that performed strongly over the last three years but to appreciate the value in ignoring wives tales and removing the blinkers. Australia is littered with in-

vestment opportunities in affordable communities (big and small). The star performers in the next three years probably won't to be the same stars of the last three years however, just like Guyra, you're unlikely to discover these gems through following the herd!
