Weekly Wool Market Report

October 6th - The wool market took on a very positive tone this week with consistent and strong rises over both selling days. On average most Merino types including Skirtings were 30-40 cents dearer over the course of the week with the only drag on the market being the broader Crossbred types. 36,858 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 3.6%.

Major buyers included Seatech, Fox & Lillie and PJ Morris with competition widespread amongst the buying companies. Discounts on the high vegetable matter and high mid break types that have been quite large over the past few months also narrowed.

This week's rise has placed most Merino types around 100-140 cents off their recent highs with not many weeks in the past three decades trading at a level higher than this week's close. Forward market prices were solid giving an indication of this positive sentiment continuing.

Contracts changed hands at around a 50 cent discount early into next year. AWTA test data for the September quarter was reSchute Bell Wool



leased earlier this week, showing a 6.6% increase in the weight of wool tested nation-

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale Morket Report

October 4th - There was a yarding of 1300 lambs and 1895 sheep at the Guyra saleyards.

There was a further reduction in lamb numbers while sheep were showing an increase. The quality of the lambs was very mixed, with only limited supplies of well finished good quality second cross lambs available. The usual buyers were in attendance.

Market trends were generally dearer than the previous sale with the extra heavy weights showing significant price gains. The trade and heavy weights showed smaller improvements. Restockers were active in the small lots of plain condition secondary quality lambs. Merino lambs were well supplied, showing varying degrees

and finish and a great variation in weight.

Increased supplies of grown sheep including a large selection of shorn Merino wethers. Market trends varied with the plainer condition and light weight sheep selling to a cheaper trend, while the well finished medium and heavy sheep sold firm to slightly dearer.

Our monthly meeting was held this week. We are busy organising our Christmas Dinner which will be held on our meeting day December 11th.


Our next meeting will be held on November 12th at 10am at the Bowling Club any new members would be welcome at this meeting.
