# Paddy's Guyra Cup

EVERY story has a beginning, and the story of the 2017 Guyra Cup goes back to a day in 1973.

On February 24th of that year a strapping lad was given his first ride aboard a racehorse owned by two Guyra men -Greg Mitchell and Arthur Williams.

The horse was Mountain Star who was entered in a race at Inverell, however there were only 11 jockeys available and 12 horses in the race.

With a little persuasion they managed to get the then 14 year old Paddy Cunningham approval to ride, as he was 'nearly 16'.

He rode a winner that day and fast forward 44 years and he was back in the winner's circle with Greg Mitchell, this time receiving the trophy as the trainer of Carry on Jake in the \$30,000 Guyra Cup on Saturday.

Paddy grew up at Ben Lomond and attended school in Guyra, but these days he is based at Glen Innes where he trains. But if you ask him where home is, he says Guyra.

"It was good to win a home town cup," he said. "The ride on Mountain Star was a long time ago, but it was a good day - you don't forget your first winner."

This was Carry on Jake's second win this preparation and his next hit out will be the \$40,000 Armidale Cup (1900m) on March 20.

## Hottest February for 78 years

Guyra has experienced its hottest February for 78 years. The average maximum temperature of 26.4C was highest for the month of February since 1939 when it was 26.5C. This was 3.3C higher than the long term average of 23.1C The average minimum temperature was 14.2C which was 2.4C higher than average.

The maximum temperatures of 35.1C on the 11th and 34.7C on the 12th were Guyra's hottest days on record. The previous highest was 34.4C on 3rd January 2014. The minimum of 21.2C on the 12th was also highest on record, with the previous highest 21.1C on 10th February 2004.

This follows what was the hottest January for 14 years, with average maximum temperatures of 26.2C. The average minimum of 14.9C in January was the highest on record. (Previous highest 14.1C in 1942.)

In smaller towns there aren't many one-trick ponies - and Guyra's Julie Gittoes has gone above and beyond, serving the community for decades in several different fields.

In addition to her work as Principal of Bald Blair Public School, Julie has somehow found the time to serve as secretary of the Guyra Lamb and Potato Festival and Tennis Club. All up, this accounts for almost 60 collective years of service in the community - making for a very busy couple of decades.

Julie's constant contribution has earned her a place on the NSW Hidden Treasures Honour Roll, a state government initiative that highlights the role of women in smaller communities.

The teacher and avid volunteer said that she's always willing to do more.

"I love teaching; I love the Bald Blair community and students. It's never hard to turn up for work at Bald Blair," Mrs Gittoes said.

Julie started a homework club after school to help kids get their work done, with extra equipment and assistance if necessary.

"It's all done, plus they get extra time with computers. To allow the kids to read a book for the second time, it shows tremendous growth," she said.

Julie is the secretary for the annual Lamb and Potato festival, working for weeks to train volunteers from the community. She trains hundreds

of volunteers, who then bring thousands of dollars back into the town

"I work with 30-odd groups every festival, almost 400 people - that's a lot of training! It's for the love of Guyra. The community spirit that you receive from the people - you know it helps businesses, and provides a good boost for the start of the year," Mrs Gittoes said.

Many people assume she's paid for her work - but Julie says she needs no recompense.

"It's a wonderful thing to be able to give your time for your community," she said.

"It's an inspiration - it's run by very few people, and considering what they throw at us we must be mad."

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall recently presented Julie with a certificate celebrating her recognition on the Honour Roll.

"Julie has the instant presence to capture and inspire a crowd," Mr Marshall said

"Whether it's through directing the education of primary school students or organising dozens of volunteers for the Guyra Lamb and Potato Festival, people are happy to follow Julie's lead and get work done.

"In smaller communities, everyone needs to roll up their shirt sleeves and take part. Over decades Julie has worked in spades and ensured others were happy to lend a hand as well."

The St Mary of the Angels Transition class for 2017 has embraced big school with great enthusiasm! Our transition program runs one day a week for the full school year, allowing for our newest students to become familiar and confident with school routines.

### **Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Weekly Market Report**

There was a yarding of 4350 lambs and 4200 sheep on Wednesday March 1.It was a reduced penning of lambs with increased supplies of grown sheep. The quality and supply of the trade and heavy weight lambs was again very high, although just behind last week's show sale. There was a good supply of well-bred young lambs suitable to the restockers along with a fair supply of light weight Merino lambs.

The regular buyers were in attendance. Market trends varied with demand for the good quality restocker lambs high, the major orders coming from as far away as the Riverina and Victoria. Market trends remained firm with an odd dearer sale. Well finished trade weight young lambs sold to a slightly cheaper trend with a small quality related increment. There were isolated dearer sales on the better quality lambs. Heavy and extra heavy lambs attracted keen demand from both domestic trade and export orders with the market remaining firm.

There was a good quality and condition penning of heavy sheep, both ewes and wethers. The medium and light weight sheep saw a large variation in condition. Competition was strong and demand high from all buyers. The market trend was dearer for the heavy weights with some weight related price improvements. The light and medium weight sheep also sold to a dearer market trend with some quality related price change.

## No tornadoes this time for Crooked Tree

The first attempt to launch the long awaited album for local band Crooked Tree did not go exactly as planned. In fact the launch was put on the backburner when a storm hit the Lamb and Potato Festival in January wiping out the music tent and taking band member Ian Russell with it.

Now almost two months down the track the band are planning a second attempt to launch their album "Devils Pinch" - this time in the sturdier, bricks and mortar venue of the Guyra Bowling Club. The date has been set for Friday March 17th and no doubt they will be keeping an eye on the weather forecast - just in case.

"We know there were a lot of locals who were planning to be at the launch and unfortunately the weather turned against us," Ian said. "Our major goal this time is to avoid a tornado and not end up in hospital."

Of course Ian is referring to the freak storm that hit just hours before the band was set to perform and officially launch their first album. It is not something he ever wants to experience again.

While he doesn't remember much of what happened that night, Ian is extremely grateful to the emergency services who came to his aid and also the staff at the

Guyra MPS and intensive care unit at Armidale Hospital - they literally saved his life.

After being laid low with a fractured skull and leg injuries, Ian is now well on the road to recovery, and the band have been back rehearsing.

"We are all looking forward to getting back to live performances,"

Ian said. "We're a Guyra band and there was a real sense that we wanted to do the live launch in our home town - we hope that people will come out and support us."

The launch night will include original songs from the "Devil's Pinch" album, as well as the covers they are regularly perform. They have already had some great feedback for the album which will be on sale on the night. It was recorded at Keystone Studios in Armidale and produced and engineered by Al Heeney.

"We are really proud of the album and happy with the way it turned out," he said. "This will be the first time it will be played in public and it will be a great show."





# Roadworks underway for Guyra-Tingha Road

Roadworks to improve the East-West corridor between Guyra and Tingha will begin this week, as part of a series of works undertaken by Armidale Regional Council designed to improve the stability, usability and durability of local roads.

An 800 metre stretch of the Guyra-Tingha Road located at the Moredun Bridge Flats will be rehabilitated and widened to 9 metres, with an 8 metre seal applied.

Armidale Regional Council's Group Leader for Service Delivery, Mark Piorkowski, said the weather conditions and increased volume of traffic have had an impact on the road.

"During winter, the Moredun Bridge Flats section of the road is known to flood and, over time, this has caused the road to deteriorate," said Mr Piorkowski.

"We are initiating an engineering solution to correct this problem and widening the road to cope with the increased traffic, and in particular heavy vehicle traffic, that is utilising this important stretch of road."

The work at Moredun Bridge Flats is the first of two sections of road aimed at improving the Guyra-Tingha road link.

Following the completion of the Moredun Flat Bridge section - expected to take approximately four to five weeks - work on a 1.2 kilometre length of the Guyra-Tingha Road at Loxton Road, Wandsworth, will begin.

# Expert looking for local birds of prey

One of Australia's leading raptor experts will be delivering a special presentation on the plight of birds of prey on the Northern Tablelands at a 'Recognising Your Raptors Field Day' coming up in the Ben Lomond/Llangothlin area on Tuesday March 21st.

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services is hosting a series of events as part of a new project to raise awareness of the birds of prey that call the Tablelands home and halt the decline in local populations of the Little Eagle, the Square-tailed Kite, and the White-bellied Sea-Eagle.

It may surprise people to know how rare these birds now are. Each of these birds is listed in NSW as a 'threatened species' (category Vulnerable) which means their numbers are in decline to the point of being at risk of extinction in the long term.

Ecologist and raptor specialist, Steve Debus, is searching the Northern Tablelands for raptor nests with the aim of monitoring their breeding success over the coming season. "The Northern Tablelands may be one of the few places left in the State where habitat is still in relatively good condition," said Steve.

"Lakes and large water bodies in inland areas provide very important habitat for raptors such as the Sea Eagle, which is mostly considered a coastal bird."

The breeding success and life expectancy of inland birds of prey have dropped dramatically, particularly in pairs of Little Eagles which he has been personally studying since 1980.

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services Project Manager, Carina Johnson, said it's a privilege to have Steve involved in the Birds of Prey Project and take the time to speak with local communities about where these birds are in our landscape.

Landholders are invited to take part in the Recognising Your Raptors Field Day Guyra on Tuesday March 21.
