

Simon Murray has put his name forward to stand at the September council election, saying that he will put rural issues at the forefront of his campaign.

He is the first resident of the

"I have been approached to run by a lot of people and I share their concerns that all the representation is coming from Armidale

and all the talk is about the city," Simon said.

"Rural issues are equally important - what is happening on the regions roads and farms matters and if elected I aim to make sure that rural views are being portrayed to other councillors and staff," he said.

"My top priorities are roads and ensuring that the Guyra water supply is secure."

Simon was a councillor with Guyra Shire for 3 1/2 years, topping the ballot at the 2012 poll and served as Deputy Mayor prior to the amalgamation.

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Hearts matter for CWA

The recent Country Womens Asociation Conference, held at Tumbi Umbi brought together country women from across the State to discuss matters which affect its members and rural communities.

During the week-long conference over 20 motions were put to the members from Health issues to Transport and Coal Seam Gas issues.

Among the motions was one from the Guyra Branch asking that the policy of the CWA of NSW shall be to advocate for the establishment and funding of a cardiac bus service to visit regional and remote areas of NSW.

The motion was moved by Leonie Hawkins of Guyra Branch and seconded by Eileen Mitchell of Armidale Branch.

Cardiovascular conditions, which include heart attack and stroke, kill one Australian every 12 minutes and are the leading cause of death in Australia.

Statistics show that one in four people living in regional and rural areas experience the disease, compared with one in five in metropolitan areas, according to the National Heart Foundation of Australia.

A bus already operates in Queensland thanks to Brisbane cardiologist Dr Rolf Gomes who has taken it upon himself to address the issue of remoteness and inaccessibility of services for cardiac patients in rural and remote areas of the

State.

Known as "The Heart Bus", Dr Gomes built and equipped a semitrailer and took the mobile clinic to the road. He has seen in excess of 2,600 patients and these are people who might never have seen a cardiologist.

Dr Gomes said the "Heart of Australia" mobile clinic was an ambitious

pilot that proved specialist services city people often took for granted could be delivered to remote rural regions.

The Motion was passed by the members of the NSW CWA and will now be adopted as policy for the CWA, and the Executive will now advocate for the establishment of such a bus.

Help needed to keep canteen operating

Parents of students at Guyra Central School are being urged to get involved in the running of the school's canteen or face the prospect of this vital service having to close its doors.

The Parents and Citizens Association operates the canteen via a special sub-committee which supports the paid supervisors. However a lack of people willing to become part of the canteen committee may force the P & C to outsource the running of the canteen or even close the doors.

P & C President Aimee Hutton said that they are having difficulty attracting new members and the canteen roles are proving even more difficult.

"The canteen is a vital part of the school - it is really a social hub within the school community providing our students with affordable and healthy food," Aimee said. "It is also a great place to volunteer and get to know not only the kids but other parents and the staff."

"However, if we can't form a committee, we may have to advertise for tenders from independent operators and failing

this the canteen may have to close," she said.

"We are doing everything we can to keep the canteen going, but we really need a few more people to step in and take on these roles."

The lack of volunteers is not only a problem for the canteen, but also means that fundraising has become a struggle for the P & C's small band of helpers. The P & C supports the school with funding for a wide range of projects, recently funding the purchase of iPads, a new cricket pitch, cloud sacs and shirts for students representatives. They also assist with putting on the school formal, sponsoring end of year prizes and pay to send the school captains to Sydney each year.

A show of support at the AGM is all that is needed to keep things running. It is scheduled for June 13th starting at 6pm at Rafters. If you are unable to attend the meeting but would like to find out more Aimee would love to hear from you.

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale Market Report

There was a reduction in lamb numbers as the selling season winds down and producers attempt to add more weight before frost damages feed supplies. The quality of the offering was generally good with well finished trade and heavy weights well supplied. There was not as much restocker competition however there were also fewer numbers of suitable lambs on offer. The regular processors were in attendance.

Market trends through both the trade and heavy weight lambs were slightly cheaper. There were weight related price changes and also an increase in some skin values that contributed to carcase price changes. There was little change in the market for crossbred lambs to restockers, with some trade weights returning to the paddock.

A single line of heavy Merino wethers carrying a 3" fine wool skin were a standout in the reduced penning of grown sheep. Otherwise, it was a mixed quality penning. Market trends were slightly cheaper throughout, with weaker buyer demand. Carcase prices may vary from those displayed due to variations between skin values and wool values with some of the longer Merino skins being processed differently.

October start date for CBD upgrade

The Bradley Street streetscape.will soon be transformed following final approval of more than \$2 million through the NSW G o v e r n m e n t 's Stronger Regions Fund.

ARC is currently finalizing the engineering design with the intention of taking Concept Plans to the community to assist in the development of construction plans.

Work will be carried out in three stages commencing in October and is expected to take a total of four months. This will be spread over two periods during October and November, recommencing in February



and March. There will be no work during December and January to avoid clashing with the peak shopping period and tradies holi-

days. It is anticipated (subject to consultation with the shop owners) that the project will be done in stages - Stage 1 will be Ollera to Moore St, Stage 2 Moore St to Nincoola St and Stage 3 Nincoola to MacKenzie St The total Guyra Main Street project has a projected cost of \$2.77 million with additional funds for the upgrade being provided through Council's Water Fund, the Sewer Fund and Section 94 contributions.

The adopted plan for the main street project includes full reconstruction of the road pavement, footpath paving and new kerb and gutters. The design incorporates three pedestrian crossings which will assist with traffic calming. It also includes street landscaping, bins and seats and new street lights.

Funding for Showground improvements

Armidale Regional Council has approved funding of \$201,590 towards Guyra Showground improvements.

The project will address some of the high priority enhancements required for the Showground as identified by the Guyra Showground Committee through the development of the Guyra Showground Plan. Work will include upgrades to electrical facilities and the provision of a new cattle shed.

Council Administrator Ian Tiley said that Show Society's activities are invaluable to the community - presenting opportunities for local people to meet, socialise and showcase local knowledge and skills.

"There is also direct economic flow on to the Guyra business community," Dr Tiley said. "The upgraded Guyra Showground facili-

ties will increase the Society's capacity to host events."

Upgrading the electrical wiring will allow for safer night time activities, replace ageing equipment and alleviate overloading on power points and the need to run long power leads during the annual show. It will also increase capacity at the showground to host more and larger events.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that the existing cattle shed has served the Guyra community well but it is in desperate need of replacement to continue to serve the needs of the showground.

"At this year's show, local producers and exhibitors were lobbying hard for the replacements of the sheds, so I am delighted that they will soon have their new, modern and comfortable facility.

"Locals can look forward to increased patronage of this great facility, which will bring more money into the town and further support the work of the Showground Committee."

The Stronger Regions Funding approved for this project is part of the NSW Government's Stronger Communities Fund provided to Councils that have undertaken mergers in NSW.

Start to Tenterden Bridge

Road works will soon start on a safer two-lane concrete bridge at Tenterden replacing the ailing wooden structure, which was built in the 1960's.

The new concrete bridge will be constructed alongside the existing timber bridge, which will be demolished following the opening of the new bridge.

The project is funded under Round 2 of the Australian Government's Bridges Renewal Programme, which upgrades local bridges across the country, ensuring communities and businesses can access essential services and easily move freight.

Total funding for the project of \$1.6m will come from the Australian Government committing \$530,000, the New South Wales Government \$510,000, and Armidale Regional Council \$20,000.

Deputy Prime Minister and Federal Member for New England Barnaby Joyce

said that the New England electorate is reaping the benefits of the Australian Government's investment in local infrastructure.

"This is a crucial investment in our regional economies, as better bridges reduce the time needed to move freight from farms and local industry, increasing productivity and economic gains," Mr Joyce said.

Armidale Regional Council will undertake the works on the Tenterden Road project, with work expected to commence in the coming weeks and due for completion later in the year.
