Wool Works nurtures interest in shearing

Organisers and students have declared a new shearing and wool handling program for secondary school students a success.

The Wool Works trial day saw Year 9 and 10 students from Guyra Central School learn about animal husbandry, biosecurity, workplace health and safety, wool and sheep handling as well as trying their hand at shearing.

The one-day intensive school was a team effort between Regional Development Australia Northern Inland (RDANI), NSW DPI, Northern Tablelands Local Land Services, TAFE New England, Glen Innes Severn Council, Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) and Heiniger.

RDANI Chair Russell Stewart said the Wool Works Shearing School trial was a great opportunity to showcase this exciting industry to the region's up and coming workforce.

"Keeping quality young people in the bush, providing them with opportunities to learn and work where they live should be top priorities for all communities across the region," he said. "The students that participated in this trial are a real credit to their

school, community and their families. They showed a keen interest in the industry and were willing to get in, have a go and ask questions."

Experienced shearers Ross Thompson and Leo Fittler instructed, supervised and also commended the attentive local students.

"If you can shear a sheep and do some crutching, you've got handy skills for the rural industry. It's also a great profession to consider for travelling and even students going on to university can use shearing shed skills to pay their way," Mr Thompson said.

"Providing introductory skills in shearing and wool handling to high school students and nurturing their interest is a unique approach and one that is important for the future of the industry."

Remembrance Day - Saturday, 11th November

The Guyra RSL sub-Branch will hold a Remembrance Day ceremony at the Soldiers Memorial Hall in Bradley Street, commencing at 10.55am on Saturday, 11th November.

Everyone who can is urged to attend as a show of respect for all our servicemen and women who have served in all conflicts.

2017 brings to the fore the centenary of many of the First World War battles in which soldiers from Guyra fought: Bullecourt, Messines, Menin Road, Polygon Wood, Broodseinde Ridge, and the muddiest and bloodiest of them all -Passchendaele.

This year, 11th November marks the 99th anniversarv of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914-18). Each year on this day Australians observe one minute's silence at 11.00am in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed con-

The Flanders poppy has long been a part of Remembrance Day, the ritual that marks the Armistice of 11 November 1918, and is also increasingly being used as part of Anzac Day observances.

During the First World War, red poppies were among the first plants to spring up in the devastated battlefields of northern France and Belgium. In soldiers' folklore, the vivid red

of the poppy came from the blood of their comrades soaking the ground. The sight of poppies on the battlefield at Ypres (Ieper) in 1915 moved Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae to write the poem "In Flanders Fields". In English literature of the nineteenth century, poppies had symbolised sleep or a state of oblivion; in the literature of the First World War a new, more powerful symbolism was attached to the poppy the sacrifice of shed blood.

At 11.00am on 11th November, 1918 the guns of the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. The allied armies had driven the German invaders back, having inflicted heavy defeats upon them especially over the preceding four months. In November the Germans called for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace settlement. They accepted allied terms that amounted to unconditional surrender.

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the post-war years. The moment when hostilities ceased on the Western Front became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war. This first modern world conflict had brought about the mobilisation of over 70 million people and left between 9 and 13 million dead, perhaps as many as one-third of them with no known grave. The allied nations chose this day and time for the commemoration of their war

Increase in needs-based funding for local schools

NORTHERN **Tablelands** MP Adam Marshall has announced a 5.2 per cent increase, an additional \$1.08 million, in needs-based recurrent funding for Northern Tablelands public schools in 2018.

Schools across the Northern Tablelands electorate will receive more than \$22 million next year. Bald Blair Public School will receive \$54,298, Ben Lomond \$26,176, Black Mountain \$62,775 and Guyra Central will receive \$693,165.

Mr Marshall said this additional support was a result of the NSW Government being the first to sign up to and fully fund the Gonski education agreement, which will deliver \$5 billion in additional funding to NSW students over six

He said that this year, the fourth under the needs-based allocation model, funding for Northern Tablelands schools increased by \$4 million.

"With these extra resources for 2018, our local Northern Tablelands schools will benefit from an additional \$12.57 million in recurrent funding under the NSW Government's

Resource Allocation Model (RAM) - and there's still more to come," Mr Marshall said.

"In total, the 59 Northern Tablelands public schools will receive \$22.06 million in needs based equity funding next vear.

"It's what NSW public schools have always wanted a significant increase in funding guaranteed into the future, with the greatest benefits flowing to schools and students with the greatest need.

"The core of the state government's Local Schools, Local Decisions reforms is to put decision-making about students and school communities with the people who know them best - the principals, school staff and parents," he said.

"The distribution of funds on a needs basis under the RAM gives them exactly that opportunity.

"Many schools in the Northern Tablelands electorate will see additional benefits in areas such as literacy and numeracy support, teachers' professional development and community engagement.

Storm season prompts safety precaution

Essential Energy is encouraging residents across regional New South Wales to be prepared for storm season and aware of electrisafety during wild weather events.

Manager Community Relations Northern, David Crough, said severe storms could damage homes and the electricity network, causing unplanned power outages for customers.

"Traditionally, the storm season occurs from October

through to March but it's never too late to prepare your property for severe weather by removing debris and overgrown vegetation from around the home and clearing gutters," David said.

"Residents are advised to have a battery-powered torch handy, along with candles and waterproof matches, and a list of emergency contact numbers including Essential Energy's 24-hour 13 20 80 number."

"It's also useful to have a portable radio with spare batteries to keep you informed of the situation, non-perishable food, a can opener, some spare clothing and fresh drinking water."

During a storm, residents are advised to stay indoors, unplug sensitive electronic equipment like televisions and computers, and check social media via mobile phones for updates.

"Take care when walking or driving after a storm as

fallen powerlines can be hidden by vegetation or other debris," said David.

"Stay at least eight metres away fallen powerlines or any objects in contact with them, always assume they are live and report any network faults to Essential Energy immediately on 13 20.80.

"AWI and TAFE have done a lot, but what we're trying to get going is more consistent, reliable training for the north of the state. Shearing is a trade. Just like if you're a builder, sparky or plumber, you're looking at four years before you know what you're doing and six before you're hitting your peak. The shearing school is a great introduction," he said.

The Wool Works Shearing School trial was a big step forward, according to RDANI Executive Officer Nathan Axelsson. "This event showed us just how effective rural and regional communities can be when industry and community leaders work together with schools and government agencies to achieve a common goal," he said. "We particularly appreciated the contributions of NSW DPI, Nigel Brown LLS District Veterinarian, Pauline Smith at TAFE New England, John Newsome of Elders Glen Innes who kindly provided the sheep, the Lions Club of Glen Innes for catering and especially Guyra Central School".

Mr. Axelsson is now optimistic that the successful trial will see school groups from across northern NSW flocking to Glen Innes for the Wool Works Shearing and Wool handling School into the future.

Weekly Wool Market Report

The first day of sales in Sydney this week delivered a relatively flat result with very little change in most micron categories.

The early market report on the final day was also indicating a fully firm market, however by the close of the sale a very different story emerged.

The Fine & Superfine Merino types ended the week around 40 cents dearer pushing both the Northern and Eastern market indicators to their second highest weekly closing levels.

The Crossbred sector remains the only noticeable drag on the market whilst the already strong Merino Carding indicator jumped a further 27 cents. 42,084 bales were sold nationally for the week with a low passed in rate of 3.2%.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Seatech and Lempriere with good support from most of the trade. Next week's expected national offering has risen to a total in excess of 47,000 bales, continuing the trend of nearly ever sale week this season being larger than the corresponding week the previous season.

With 11% more wool offered for the season to date combined with a higher market the total value of wool sold has already eclipsed the billion dollar mark.

Congratulations to the fabulous Brain Olympia Team from St Mary of the Angels School who competed in Inverell on Tuesday 24th Octo-


