New Abattoir plans unveiled

Armidale businessmen Rob Taber and Shane Voigt have announced plans to build a new sheep and goat abattoir in Guyra.

The proposal is for a \$45m state of the art, solar powered facility capable of processing 2000 animals a day. If the project goes ahead 150 jobs will be created in the short term, expanding to 300 in the long term.

Mr Taber has been working on the idea for a few years and had originally planned for the facility to be built in Armidale.

Speaking at last week's sheep sale in Guyra Mr Taber said the Armidale project

was 'getting all too hard'.

They have now set their sights on Guyra and last Monday they signed an offer on land adjacent to the saleyards owned by Geoffrey Bell. Taber and Voigt have taken a two year option on the land.

"We want to get this abattoir to happen and we want the community of Guyra to get behind this," Mr Taber said. "As of today we are moving forward."

The next step will be to carry out a feasibility study and they are hoping the Federal Government will provide the money for this..

Have your say.....

Having looked at the concept plans for the re-construction of Bradley Street, Guyra, I can only conclude this to be the proposed greatest waste of public money that I have ever seen. I did work in Local Government for over 40 years and this proposal must qualify as the all-time greatest money waster that I have encountered in my working career.

I do agree that Bradley Street needs to be resealed and I would suggest a good heavy hot-mix would do the job very well. The footpaths are quite adequate in width and only lack a little TLC. I cannot see any justification in placing what would be unused tables, chairs and umbrellas in the way of pedestrian traffic. Obviously the designers of the concept plan are not familiar with the Guvra climate otherwise they would have noted the need for heating devices in shops

along the street.

There is an urgent need for handicapped parking spaces to be allocated ON Bradley Street (not around the corner in a side street) and I would suggest at least one in front of the pharmacy, one and maybe two at IGA and one in the area of Spar/GALA. It is important to retain as many parking spaces as possible and without changing to nose-in or reverse parking.

Mayor Murray has asked for 'positive suggestions' and I submit that he should read the letters published in the Guyra Gazette, and no doubt many other letters forwarded direct to Council, call a public meeting and really listen to what the vast majority of the Guyra community are saying. Such a meeting should be called for a time that allows business owners and their staff to attend and have their say.

Weekly Wool Market Report

December 1 - After last week's dip in the market it came as somewhat of a surprise to see things consolidate and continue to strengthen as the week progressed. Most Merino types finished the week dearer whilst the Crossbreds continued to lose ground resulting in no change to the Northern region indicator for the week.

46,912 bales were sold nationally for the week out of the 49,058 offering with a passed in rate of 4.4%. The top four buyers have remained relatively similar over the past few months and between them they purchased over 45% of the national

Merino fleece offering this week. AWTA test data released this morning is showing a 4.6% increase in the volume of wool tested for the season to date. AWEX auction data is showing an 8% increase in bales offered. This certainly indicates a sell down of previous seasons grower held stocks in stores across the country. Volumes traded in the forward market lifted considerably this week with some historically high prices achieved for the first quarter of next year, indicating just how solid the current level of demand is.

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale Market Report

November 29th - Around 25% of the lamb offering were early new season lambs, with Merino lambs showing varying degrees of finish, well supplied. There were limited supplies of old crossbred lambs penned. The quality of the young lambs was excellent and showed very good weight for age. The Merino lambs were a combination of grain assisted, young well finished lots suitable to restockers. The usual buyers were in attendance and there were quite a few restockers active.

Comparing market trends to the sale 2 weeks ago, the young lambs in all weight classes sold to dearer trends of \$6/head and more in places with increased weights accounting for greater price movements. Restockers were active on the lighter weights.

The well finished old lambs followed the dearer trend with price



improvements similar to those of the young lambs. Once again weight increases accounted for some of the larger price gains. Merino lambs attracted competition from trade, export processors and local restockers. Market trends showed improvements of as much as \$16/head on the heavy weights, but less on the trade and restocker lambs.

The majority of the sheep showed the benefit of what is a very good season. Heavy weights were well supplied. Market trends were dearer throughout with some prices improving considerably due to weight increases.

Volunteers honoured

Guyra Home Support Services hosted a special event on Tuesday to recognize its generous and dedicated volunteers as part of International Volunteers Day.

There were 23 volunteers recognized at this event for the work they do in the Guyra and Tingha Communities.

In total there are 62 volunteers with the service who have put in around 3000 hours of voluntary work over the last 12 months. Home Support Services coordinator Sally Burey said that the volunteer hours represent a huge saving to the community.

"You can imagine how much that saves the service so it is much appreciated, "Ms Burey said. "The hours that our volunteers put in equates to around \$80,000 of unpaid work."

Mr Joyce was well ahead in the poll claiming 65% of first preference votes, well ahead of his main rivals Labor's David Ewings and Independent Rob Taber. Mr Ewings received around 11% of first prefernces votes and Mr Taber around 7%.

Visiting Guyra last week, where he met with local farmers, it was clear that he was amongst friends. This support was evident at local polling booths where Mr Joyce was clear favourite. claimed 810 out of 1080 votes cast at Guyra Central School which equates to 75% support. Tingha voted 267 out of 407 votes to Mr Joyce, at Ben Lomond he collected 88 of the 101 votes and at Black Mountain he received 133 out of 162 votes

Ben Lomond students participated in an exciting STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) Camp recently at Thalgarrah Environmental Field Studies Centre, near Armidale.

Students from Years 3 to 6 attended for two days, whilst those students in Kinder to Year 2 attended for Day 1. Across the two days students were involved in making wind turbines, using Spheros, BeeBots and Scratch Junior, to code, Astronomy and designing and building billy carts.

The students worked in groups with students from Bald Blair, Black Mountain, Chandler, Ebor and Niangala Public Schools on their projects.

On Day 2 the students had to design a billycart, make a model and then assist the boys from STROUD homes make the billy cart. The students quickly discovered that you need to be clear about what it is you want your builder to do and how models may need to be modified to work with the materials you have.

The billycarts will be used in a Billy cart derby to be held at Ben Lomond Public School on Thursday December 14th.

All students enthusiastically engaged in the sessions modelling a commitment to learn and improve.

FREE university degrees are up for grabs for budding young teachers, as part of a NSW Government initiative to attract the best teachers to country NSW, Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall announced today.

Mr Marshall said scholarships would be on offer in 2018 to fully fund the university degrees of 60 new teachers, paying their HECS debt if they accept a posting at one of more than 150 eligible rural and remote public schools, including 19 across the Northern Tablelands.

"Students awarded the scholarship

must maintain a credit average throughout their university studies," Mr Marshall said.

"Scholarships will be available to new and enrolled students and include a stipend of \$7,500 per year to assist students with their studies.

"A \$6,000 'sign on' bonus is also provided when they start their new job to help with the cost of relocation."

Mr Marshall is encouraging local students to apply for the scholarship and go into a teaching career in country NSW.

"Great teachers are an integral part of

our local schools, and encouraging the best and brightest to join our local community is important to ensure we continue to have outstanding teachers in our schools," he said.

The free degree is one of several changes in the NSW Government's \$140 million Rural and Remote package to boost education standards in country schools.


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Guyra wins at New England Sports Awards
