Rail transport needed

NSW and the Australian nation will benefit hugely from the re-establishment of a viable and efficient rail transport network including the re-use of the Great Northern rail corridor north of Armidale.

Our area of northern NSW has been sadly neglected at both State and Federal Government level for many years in rail and road transport needs.

The Great Northern rail corridor could be a cost effective and viable alternative to the Inland rail line linking Melbourne and Brisbane.

Many believe freight and passenger services were ceased north of Armidale because it was no longer viable - this was not the case - it was due to poor management and a change in government policy.

The Save the Great Northern Rail Group was formed some years ago to oppose a proposal to remove the line and infrastructure for the formation of a Rail Trail. Our incorporated group is not against the idea of a cycle way. We vehemently oppose the destruction of the Permanent Way rendering the historic much loved Great Northern railway corridor useless for any future use as a train line.

Locally the re-instatement of rail services on the Great North-

ern railway would create far greater economic and social benefit to our region than a rail trail. MP Adam Marshall has muted that a closure of the corridor north of Armidale is on his agenda, this would facilitate the ripping up of the line and destruction of the Permanent Way for construction of a dubious cycle way.

Recently I have received an invitation from the Department of Premier & Cabinet to a Stakeholder Consultation re-Armidale to Wallangarra Rail Corridor, this is the third attempt to hold these so-called workshops. To the best of my knowledge I am the only person to be informed of this meeting in the Guyra area, so I implore all stakeholders, (including adjoining landholders and residents, businesses and anyone concerned for the future of the corridor) to attend this meeting in Guyra on Tuesday December 12th at the Guyra Bowling & Recreation Club.

Weekly Wool Market Report

The wool market ended a nine week streak of upward movement with falls fairly consistent across the board. Taking its cue from a slightly softer closing on the final day of last week the market opened to a mixed result on the first day of sales.

The fine and superfine types finished the day slightly dearer whilst the medium Merino and Crossbred types closed cheaper. The final day of sales produced a cheaper market for all types with losses increasing late in the day. 44,326 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 6.4%.

Major buyers included Seatech, Techwool and Tianyu with the top two accounting for a third of all the Merino fleece wool between them.

A large jump in bales rostered for next week's sale may partially explain this week's market dip. Almost 52,000 bales are now expected to be on offer nationally next week which is almost a 7000 bale increase on the predicted figures from this time last week.

The increased size of the offerings has allowed buyers to become more selective leading to greater discounting of "off type" heavier vegetable matter lots.

New Tenterden bridge ready to take the load

Almost 60 years after it was first built the one lane timber bridge over Georges Creek at Tenterden will soon make way for a two lane concrete replacement.

The new bridge has been constructed upstream of the existing bridge, and will enable access by heavy vehicles such as B Doubles.

The work was carried out by Newcastle-based company Bridgebuild and Civil with contractor Jarrod Buttsworth enlisting local grazier Rob Martin to assist with the project.

The new bridge will meet increased demand for stock and fodder transport for landholders in the district. Heavy vehicles are currently required to take a 67km detour due to weight restrictions.

The future of the old bridge remains uncertain, with a number of options currently being considered. The options include demolition to salvage the timber or sale to a nearby landholder. Work on the approaches to the new bridge has been delayed, with the expected completion date of November 30 pushed back.

Council is hopeful of a pre-Christmas opening, however this is reliant on other works currently underway.

The Tenterden Road Bridge Replacement project is funded with the Australian Government committing \$530,000, the New South Wales Government \$510,000, and Armidale Regional Council \$20,000.
