# Small school, big results

Guyra Central School students have exceeded expectations with outstanding results in this year's Higher School Certificate.

Three students were named in the Distinguished Achiever's List for receiving the top band in their courses.

Relieving Principal Michelle Nicholson said that overall the results for the whole class were fantastic.

"With only 15 students in the class, including vocational students, to get 13 band 5s and 7 band 6s is exceptional," Mrs Nicholson said.

"To achieve band 6s across a range of subjects is a credit to the teaching staff."

The top performer was Logan Stanley who achieved three band 6 results in Modern History, Biology and PDHPE. Logan's 97.4 ATAR means he can follow his chosen path to study physiotherapy at either Newcastle or Brisbane.

"I'm stoked with the result

- I put in the effort and it was good to see that it paid off," Logan said.

"The teaching staff were all helpful and very supportive and I think we were lucky being in a small school where you could have that one on one interaction. All of the teachers went out of their way to see us achieve."

Kelsie Youman was not far behind achieving an ATAR of 94.65, including three band 6 results in Art, Agriculture and Biology. Kelsie is interested in Zoology and plans to go to the University of Queensland studying a Bachelor of Science. She described her reaction to her marks as 'very happy, I wasn't expecting it to be that high."

Brodie Harman received a band 6 for his Ancient History course and was pleased with his ATAR of 82.35.

He is planning on studying a Bachelor of International Security studies at ANU in Canberra.

## Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale Market Report

**December 13th** - The last sale for the year produced a fair quality yarding with a fair selection of trade lambs along with odd pens of heavy weights. Store lambs were well supplied.

Light weight lambs to the restockers were \$4 to \$6 dearer with the restockers paying from \$63 to \$118/head.

Trade lambs were firm with the trade weight new season lambs selling from \$120 to \$164/head to average between 660c and 690c/kg cwt.

Trade weight old lambs sold from \$112 to \$168/head. Heavy weight lambs were also firm with the over 22kg 4 score new season lambs selling from \$170 to \$194 while the heavy weight old lambs sold to \$210/head.

Merino lambs were \$2 dearer with the trade weights selling from \$108 to \$138/head. Hoggets sold to \$150/head.

It was a mostly good quality yarding of mutton where the market was \$4 to \$6/head cheaper compared to the previous sales strong market. 2 score ewes sold from \$35 to \$85, while the better 3 and 4 scores sold from \$82 to \$150/head for both crossbreds and Merinos. Merino wethers sold to \$162/head

### *Weekly Wool* Market Report

**December 15th** - The final sale of 2017 resulted in large price increases across all micron ranges as buyers scrambled to secure wool prior to the Christmas recess.

There was another large offering with growers keen to get wool into the market and take advantage of the current strong market conditions. Prior to the market opening this week buyers were reporting intense interest from their customers highlighting that these price levels are not only attributed to low supply, but also strong demand.

Major gains were again seen in the Merino and finer Crossbred types. A number of these micron indicators finished at record levels including the carding indicator which continues to amaze most market observers. Chinese buyers dominated purchasing again however there is very strong competition coming from European and Indian interests. This widespread competition has created intense bidding from buyers in the sale room.

For the 2017 calendar year the total dollar value of wool sold has surpassed the 3 billion dollar mark. The last time this amount was achieved was back in 1995 when wool production levels were far greater than present. The EMI is over 400c/kg ahead of the same period last year.



## Gaining ground on soil health

The international community recently acknowledged the life-giving quality of the earth under our feet when individuals and organisations across the globe celebrated World Soil Day.

This year's theme was 'Caring for the Planet Starts from the Ground', an intent shared and prioritised by Northern Tablelands Local Land Services.

For the past four years, Northern Tablelands Local Land Services has presented the Soil Health & Production Workshop series across the region with funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program. Local Land Services Officer Beth Brown said the workshops are designed to broaden producers' awareness and knowledge base through theory and hands-on application to gain the most from their operation, while protecting and enriching the soils on their land.

"Having a healthy soil means having the physical, biological and chemical components all working together, resulting in effective nutrient cycling and water infiltration", Beth said.

The comprehensive workshops are growing in popularity. The first workshop covers what a healthy soil looks like, how to assess this in the paddock and what can be done to improve or maintain a healthy soil. The second workshop digs a little deeper (pardon the pun) by working through the test results from the soil samples submitted by participants.

She said the soil test outcomes from a recent Guyra workshop inspired the participants, including Angela Landers.

"I'm really keen to go home, test more paddocks and make a plan for our nutrient requirements for our property, and apply what we actually need rather than just applying the standard," Angela said.

Beth said they are planning another round of workshops for 2018 and encourages landholders and producers to keep an eye on the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services Facebook page, website, App or contact Beth Brown on 0429 773 453 or beth.brown@lls.nsw.gov.au.

We need to stop finding obstacles

I am writing to express my support for the New England Rail Trail proposal.

Can we please be clear on these simple facts - the debate is about two things:

1. to convert the existing, unused rail line to a Rail Trail, OR

2. to leave the rail line as is.

The debate is NOT about restoring the rail line and bringing back the trains, and therefore discussion about this is irrelevant. I think everyone in Guyra would prefer to see the rail line open and trains rolling in to Guyra every day. However, it was made crystal clear at the recent community consultation meeting that the cost to do this is prohibitive (out of the question I would suggest), and the demand is negligible.




