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Supermarket changes hands

When Louie and Mick Burey hand over the reins to their successful local business to the Ahmed family on Wednesday it will be with mixed emotions.

The couple took over the business in 2002 when it was just a small fruit and vegetable shop with a few groceries on the side.

Since then they have worked to grow the business expanding the groceries lines under the Spar banner and adding takeaway food to the mix.

"I will be a bit emotional because I really don't know anything else," Louie said.

"It is good little business and I am pleased to see new owners take it on. Guyra needs two supermarkets and having Spar here as well as IGA is good for the town."

"I am also really glad to see that all the staff are staying on. They are part of the family, especially Jess who has been here since day one, and I will be here for a little while to help out."

New owner Zahoor Ahmed hopes to build on the success of the former owners.

Originally from Pakistan, he moved to the area with his

family from Canberra two and half years ago when they took over the Black Mountain Roadhouse.

Having known Guyra for some time Zahoor believes that the town deserves some more investment.

"We were already at Black Mountain so why not come a step closer to Guyra," Zahoor said.

"I think Guyra needs more jobs and more economic activity and the business suited us."

"We are sure that Lou and her family have done very well here and have grown the business from a small plant to a big tree," Zahoor said. "So we will try to maintain the standards, understand it and then improve it where possible."

"I understand they have very good staff and all the same staff will stay on .We will just wait and see what is required and any changes we make will be based on feedback from customers."

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Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale Market Report

January 3rd - Numbers were below pre-break levels for the first sale of the year. There was a good representation of well finished young lambs along with a number of pens of crossbred lambs suitable to restockers and Merino lambs. The usual buyers were in attendance and competing strongly.

Demand for all classes was strong, resulting in firm to dearer market trends for all. Crossbred lambs sold to restockers from \$79 to \$117/head. Well finished trade weight young lambs made from \$130 to \$174/head due to weight and skin value variations.

There was not as much weight displayed in the heavy and extra heavy weight young lambs with the top price below that of the pre-Christmas sale, however prices overall were firm to dearer.

Demand was very strong for sheep with market trends dearer. There was quite a variation in price between shorn Merinos and those carrying medium skin lengths of 40-60mm.

Cash for cans open

Guyra residents can now claim their 10 cent refund on cans and drink containers with the successful installation of a local Reverse Vending Machine (RVM), at the Community Recycling Centre, as part of the new NSW Return and Earn Container Deposit Scheme.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that the RVM at Guyra's community recycling centre has collected hundreds of containers in its first weeks of operation and it seems that people across the region are enthusiastic about the scheme.

"After returning containers, users can elect to claim their deposit or donate it to a good cause," Mr Marshall said. "Local schools, charities, and community or sporting groups will be able to sign up to the scheme."

"I chose to donate the deposit to the NSW Cancer

Council and when local groups are available, I'll make sure my 10 cent refund goes their way."

Guidelines dictate that containers should be empty, uncrushed, unbroken and have their original barcode attached.

"When fully rolled out, this

scheme will help keep our region beautiful, supply valuable funding to community groups, and reward those who do the right thing."

Rails with Tails

Present rail trail proposals would not protect public ownership of rail corridors!

The assertion, espoused by some rail trail advocates in current debate in New England, that the public ownership tenure of disused rail corridors is somehow preserved and enhanced by formally closing the relevant railways and ripping them up for bike tracks is completely flawed.

Currently, NSW Government owned rail corridors in regional NSW are already preserved by virtue of the Transport Administration Act 1988. These corridors cannot be sold off unless the Transport Administration Act 1988 is amended to officially close the relevant railway. This is the very amendment being sought by rail trail advocates to enable them to rip up these railways and turn them into bike tracks. If these rail trail advocates are successful, the relevant railways will be formally closed and the former rail corridor will be transferred to crown land. Under Government initiated amendments made earlier this year, crown land can be disposed of without further reference to Parliament. As such, these current rail trail proposals, if successful would render any such former corridor vulnerable to unilateral sell off, not protect it as some rail trail advocates assert!

Rail trail advocates assert: Rail trail advocates could have their bike tracks inside rail corridors without need-

> ing legislation to formally close these railways in what is known as the rails-withtrails concept where a trail is constructed alongside the existing railway. These corridors are generally wide enough for this concept and there is generally ample separation should trains resume. No legislation is required for this and the railway corridor would retain its existing legislative protection against disposal.

> It escapes understanding why this rails-with-trails compromise is not being pursued by rail trail advocates instead of the far more controversial railway closing and destroying proposals presently being pursued.

Composting scheme coming to Guyra

ARMIDALE'S popular and award-winning organics recycling scheme City to Soil will be expanded to the Guyra community, thanks to a \$208,400 NSW Government grant, announced this week by Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall.

Pioneered in Armidale six years ago, City to Soil allows residents to recycle their kitchen waste and food scraps, even used pizza boxes and paper towels, via their green waste bin and turn it into compost for the community - with the 'black gold' it creates highly sought after in the region.

Mr Marshall was joined by Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray and to announce that Guyra residents would soon be able to access the scheme, by using special City to Soil biodegrade bags, made from broccoli, to place the organic waste in their green waste bins, rather than the regular general waste.

"Long after we're done with our food scraps, paper towels, and pizza boxes, our biowaste has another life as

compost prized by gardeners and farmers alike," Mr Marshall said.

"Scraps from Guyra will now join Armidale's biowaste, entering a carefully controlled composting process that produces Agrade fertiliser with 30 times of the City to Soil scheme.

less contamination of similar schemes in other areas of the State."

Service Leader Business Units at ARC Phillip Perram said that before the new service can be implemented in Guyra, the composting facility at Armidale will need to be upgraded to cope with the increase in green waste.

Mr Perram said that community consultation will take place over the coming months and the new service is expected to commence early next year.
