Water plight reaches the floor of State Parliament

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall has taken the plight of Guyra residents and their recent poor quality town water to the floor of State Parliament, describing the water as 'foul' and urging for immediate action to be taken.

Last week Mr Marshall formally gave notice of a motion calling upon the NSW Government to formally acknowledge Guyra's water woes and provide funding urgently for the Guyra to Malpas Dam water pipeline to boost water quality and security for the growing community.

"While I have been assured by the council that the water is safe to drink, this is yet another demonstration of the urgent need to permanently upgrade Guyra's water quality and security," Mr Marshall said.

"This water quality and discolouration issue has been occurring infrequently for many years now and residents are fed up with it and urgent works must be done to ensure it does not happen again.

"This problem arises every time the town's storage levels fall and with Guyra using far more water than is available in storage, this risks becoming a regular occurrence without immediate intervention."

Mr Marshall said the project he wanted funded would solve the issues plaguing residents with not only a new pipeline to be constructed, but also the replacement of the town's ageing water treatment facilities.

"I am calling on the government to urgently fund the \$10.5 million Malpas Dam to Guyra water pipeline, including new water treatment facilities to ensure water is always of a high standard for residents," he said.

"This will not only benefit every resident who uses town water, but also help provide infinite capacity for Guyra's expanding horticultural industry.

"Armidale Regional Council is ready to start construction of this vital infrastructure and now, all that remains are the funds necessary to break ground.

"With a watertight plan for the pipeline, a clear demand from the community and with the government now on notice, I want to see this project funded without further delay."

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale Market Report

February 14th - There was an increased penning of lambs featuring the annual show sale. As a result there was an improved penning of well finished trade and heavy weights. Restocker lambs again made up a large percentage of the offering.

The usual processors were in attendance and there were some new restocker orders in place. Trends through the well finished trade weight young lambs were firm to dearer with the better quality accounting for much of the improvement.

The good quality restocker lambs sold to a slightly dearer trend, while the plainer, light weights were a little cheaper, down by \$4 to \$7/head. Weights increased through the heavy and extra heavy weights. The market also showed dearer trends with the improvement in weights accounting for quite a lot of the price improvement. There was a reduction in numbers of grown sheep with a large percentage of the offering being cross bred ewes. Given the current state of the wool market it was a possibility that Merino breeders have withheld sheep for the purpose of shearing and value adding themselves. Market trends were cheaper throughout of \$4 to \$20/head with the plainer condition sheep most affected.

Weekly Wool Market Report

February 16 th - Whilst most micron indicators finished in the negative this week they do not necessarily give us a true snapshot of the performance of all types on offer in the market. With the \$A moving to 1.5% higher throughout the course of the selling week the indicator levels of last week could not be maintained on a highly varied offering. Better spec (low VM, good strength and low midbreak) lots continued to gain strong competition with the 18.5 micron and finer of these types closing dearer for the week. The poorer spec and particularly the poorer prepared lots suffered in comparison and this is where the greatest falls were experienced. Buyer focus is turning to

preparation standards as their customers down the pipeline are demanding highly even parcels of wool to go with these higher price levels. There was some positive momentum seen in the XB sector this week with gains of 5-20 c/kg clean seen.

In positive news for wool, Consumer confidence levels and retail sales results are increasing in our major wool consuming countries. Consumer confidence in the US, Asia and European Union are at the highest levels seen since the year 2000. *Greg Andrews*



Revised plans for main street upgrade

Revised plans for the \$2.7 million Guyra Main Street Upgrade are being displayed on shop fronts in Bradley Street, in the Guyra Administration Building and online for community feedback until Friday 16 March 2018.

Armidale Regional Council design engineers have reviewed the feedback received last year from the Guyra community and adjusted the plans. Nine parking spaces previously allocated to outdoor dining areas have been reinstated, the street stall has been moved in front of Davidson Cameron Real Estate, the pedestrian crossing and refuge has been put back in front of IGA and four accessibility parking spaces have been added.

Mayor Cr Simon Murray said the plans now included the community's feedback and have addressed previous concerns over the design.

"I am confident the revised plans for the Guyra main street have addressed the community's concerns," said Cr Murray.

"I encourage the community to review the plans and provide further feedback, we want to hear if people are happy with the revision or if they feel there is further room for improvement."

The youth of Guyra will also be involved in the project. A public art competition will be conducted with students from Guyra Central School in partnership with Council's Art and Culture Committee, with the winning entry incorporated into the main street design.

The revised plans are being displayed in Bradley Street shopfronts, in the Guyra Administration Building and online at yoursay.armidale.nsw.gov.au

Recycling centre diverting waste

A Community Recycling Centre (CRC) is now open in Guyra, allowing locals to drop off problem wastes such as paints, oils, gas bottles ewaste and batteries for free and keep them out of landfill.

CRCs have been established by Armidale Regional Council after receiving a \$223,240 grant from the NSW Government's Waste Less, Recycle More initiative.

The new recycling facilities will help council and the community keep problem wastes out of landfill, making it easier than ever before to recycle and complements the community's existing recycling services.

Waste Less, Recycle More is

a NSW Government initiative to keep waste out of landfill, increase food and garden waste collections, boost business recycling and invest in new infrastructure.

The CRC accepts the following problem wastes for free:

•water-based and oil-based paints;

•used motor oils and other

oils;

 lead-acid and hand-held batteries;

•gas cylinders and fire extinguishers;

•conventional tube and compact fluorescent lamps;

•smoke detectors;

•e-waste and mobile phones; and

• needle sharps.

We won't lose the corridor

Cr Margaret O'Connor, in a recent letter to the Armidale Express, makes a number of assertions that show her ignorance of the Rail Trail proposal and reinforce her inability to analyse the available information in a logical manner. Let me respond.

She states that if the corridor is closed to rail traffic, then it "could be a simple act of Parliament to sell off the land forever." Here Cr O'Connor shows her ignorance of the legislative process and is blatantly scaremongering. For example, the Bill for the closure of the rail line between Rosewood and Tumbarumba clearly states that the authorisation of the rail infrastructure owner in relation to the disposal of land concerned is limited to the land being dedicated under Crown Lands legislation as a rail trail for recreational use. There is every expectation that the legislation for the closure of the corridor between Armidale and Wallangarra will follow this same template. There is no reason for it not to.

Cr O'Connor suggests that a "track side" option is the solution. Anyone with any understanding of rail trails would realise that a side track on a single-track corridor in rugged country such as the Northern Tablelands simply will not work. The construction of a trail beside the rail in this corridor would require the widening of cuttings, tunnels and bridges at a huge cost. To bypass those cuttings, tunnels and bridges etc. the side track would need be built to follow the contours of surrounding country, thereby negating the primary value of a rail trail that being its relatively level gradient. Mountain bike riding and bush walking are totally different things from riding or walking a rail trail.

Cr O'Connor suggests that "driverless truck convoys, rising diesel prices and massive road subsidies" will "challenge the sustainability of 100 per cent road-based freight in the regions" implying that there may need to be a return to rail freight. No-one has yet developed a business case that shows any value in putting freight, let alone passengers, back on the Great Northern Rail. I have yet to see freight arriving by rail to Armidale.

Rail trails are more than a bike track. They are a proven and safe off-road multi-shared pathway for passive recreation for cyclists, walkers and riders. They encourage fitness, they stimulate economies through tourism and most importantly, they do not destroy rail corridors.

The Great Northern Rail Corridor is sitting idle. It needs to be closed and converted into a useable rail trail. Cr O'Connor and her fellow councillors need to be decisive on this issue and unleash the opportunities that a rail trail will bring to the region.

Call for decision on Rail Trail

I note that the Armidale Regional Council's mission is to "Unleash the Opportunities" and Guyra certainly needs these opportunities unleashed!

The locality urgently requires continued development and both the prior Guyra Shire Council and the merged Armidale Regional Council (ARC) have had the matter before them over some years for the closure of the rail corridor from Black Mountain to Ben Lomond. The line has been abandoned for 30 years and has fallen into disrepair. Additionally, there is no credible business organisation that is putting forward a business case to reopen the line as a major freight or passenger route. Plenty of "wouldn't it be nice if" but nothing otherwise.

The State Government has the means to close this corridor which would transfer it to Crown Land and should the circumstances in the future change then the corridor will still be there and can be reactivated and reopened for rail travel. An act of parliament is required for this to happen. The State Government is seeking some indication of support from the ARC for this action.

With this corridor closed then the proposal to establish a rail trail between Black Mountain and Ben Lomond can be set in motion with funding being provided for development from the State Government. This proposal fits the bill required for growth.

A rail trail will provide the opportunity to substantially grow tourism in the area and this will lead to a flow on to accommodation providers, small businesses etc and grow employment opportunities.

The alternative is for nothing to occur other than for the continued deterioration of the infrastructure and the continued near free use of the corridor by some adjacent landholders for their livestock.

Those seeking to reopen the corridor to a freight line should be careful what they ask for. Initially, all the landholders will have their grazing rights cancelled (these arrangements continue under a rail trail), the whole line infrastructure will need to be rebuilt with a new rail bed, sleepers, rails, new bridges and most likely realignment of many of the tight corners on the current track; let alone signalling, road crossings and the story goes on.

For the line to be profitable, these freight carriers would need to have the ability to facilitate trains of at least 800 to 1500 metres in length, crossing loops (passing sidings) would need to be built to accommodate this minimal length, the weight of these trains would be estimated to be in the vicinity of 9,000 tonnes up to say 25,000 tonnes, double decker containers may need to be utilised. I haven't mentioned the noise issues through towns etc; that's another story.

This freight line will not occur in our lifetime, but should circumstances alter then the corridor is there and anything is possible.

What can occur right now is for the rail trail to be commenced with immediate tourism gains and benefits for the whole region.

So come on Armidale Regional Council get on board with this and show some strong leadership instead of hiding behind further reports. Make a positive decision for the community as a whole.

Simon Says Q&A with the Mayor

Q: I have been concerned about the lack of shade over Armidale's playgrounds. Other than some of the playgrounds being too hot to use during warm weather, it is well known that living on the tablelands poses extra risk for skin cancer. Do you have any plans to prioritise sun safety for children in our community?

A: Council does not have any current plans to put more shade structures over playgrounds. There are two existing covered playgrounds targeted at young children, in the mall and at Curtis Park. If Council develops additional playgrounds designed for young children, shade structures will be incorporated into the layout. Shade structures are not installed over every playground because these structures are regularly burnt or torn by vandals. They are expensive to replace and that cost is not covered by Council's insurance.

Council does what it can to assist with sun safety, within cost constraints, to complement parents' role in supervision and education about this issue. Where possible, we try to ensure there are trees located around playgrounds to help provide shade. However, trees too close to equipment can damage equipment.

It's not often you have a good excuse to start a column with a limerick. However, the 2018 Autumn Festival in Armidale is nearly upon us and this year's event coincides with St Patrick's Day.

To tip our lid to Ireland's biggest day of national celebration, St Patrick's Day will be the theme for this year's Autumn Festival, being held from 15-18 March. We can look forward to having the Civic & Curtis Parks ringing with the sounds of traditional Irish bands and the street parade on the Saturday will be a celebration of all things green.

The 2018 festival has been expanded from three days to four, to allow an extra evening of family fun in the parklands.

Activities this year will begin on Thursday 15 March from 5pm to 10pm, with amusements rides and live bands. The following three days include arts and culture performances by the New England Conservatorium of Music, twilight markets, pipe bands, rocks bands, dancers, cycle racing, a fun run and fireworks. Car enthusiasts will enjoy two days of motoring beauty, with a classic car show on the Saturday and Motor Extravaganza the next day.

The shopfront will continue to be a hub of information about Council-related issues during coming weeks. The current round of community consultation for the Armidale CBD Revitalisation closed on Friday and thank you to everyone who took the time to offer your thoughts and ideas. More than



900 people visited the shopfront during the CBD revitalisation consultation period, between mid-December and 16 February, and around 500 have completed the survey. There is also a healthy pile of submissions and many comments in the shopfront questbook and comments board.

All this feedback will help guide a review of the revitalisation designs. The updated plans will then go back to the community for further input.

In the meantime, the focus in the shopfront will turn to information on projects such as the new business park next to Armidale Regional Airport, the New England Highway roundabout to be constructed nearby and the Malpas Dam to Guyra pipeline.
