Armidale Regional Council is on the hunt for a new Chief Executive Officer following the resignation of Peter Dennis.

Mr Dennis has resigned to take up a position within the private sector as Managing Director of Hunter H20.

He tendered his resignation last Tuesday, giving council four weeks notice.

Mayor Cr Simon Murray says it is business as usual for Council to deliver outstanding service to the community and to continue on the region's upward trajectory for growth and prosperity.

and will continue to be as we commence recruitment for a new CEO," said Cr Murray.

"Since commencing my role as Mayor and during the administration period Peter has demonstrated outstanding leadership and initiated numerous programs that will deliver outstanding customer service for our community," said Cr Murray.

"Peter has done a wonderful job for our community and will be sorely missed. On behalf of the Council we wish him all the success in his new role."

Chamber pushes for decision on Rail Trail

The Guyra and District Chamber of Commerce has written to Armidale Regional Council requesting support for the closure of the rail corridor between Black Mountain and Ben Lomond.

They have also requested Council immediately contacts the Deputy Premier, John Barilaro, to indicate its willingness to participate in the trial of three NSW locations for the development of rail trails.

Council's Regional Growth Advisory Committee has recommended it support the closure when it meets in Armidale on February 28th.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor, Simon Murray will use a Mayoral minute at the Council meeting to call for a review or business case to evaluate the case for a New England Rail Trail

Joyce turns focus to New England

Member for New England Barnaby Joyce has reaffirmed his commitment to the New England electorate after stepping down as leader of The Nationals and welcomed newly elected party leader, Michael McCormack.

Mr Joyce resigned following weeks of controversy over his relationship with staffer Vikki Campion and the breakdown of his marriage.

Media attention had focused on the contradiction between his support for family values and his actions, as well

as the alleged creation of jobs within the National Party for Campion.

In a separate incident, the Nationals last week received a formal complaint accusing Joyce of sexual harassment, which prompted him to finally step down.

Mr Joyce said he was incredibly humbled to have had the opportunity to serve regional Australia as Deputy Prime Minister and is determined to get on with the business of representing the New England.

"I extend my thanks to those who have supported me in recent months, especially those in the electorate, and I endeavour to repay that support with steadfast focus on getting a better deal for the New England.

"We have important projects already underway or in planning in the New England, including major road developments like the Tenterfield and Scone by-passes, our \$75 million commitment for Dungowan Dam, Tamworth's Northern Inland

Centre of Sporting Excellence, 37 new and upgraded mobile phone towers for the electorate - we launched the last one near Glen Innes just recently - to name but a few.

"We also have decentralisation in progress with the APVMA moving to Armidale bringing more jobs to regional Australia, and a freshly upgraded airport in Armidale as well.

"We've made big ground already for the New England and I'm excited what the future holds for us."

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale Market Report

February 21 - Lamb numbers retreated after the annual show sale increase. There were limited supplies of well finished trade and heavy weights with no extra heavy weights penned. Once again restocker lambs made up a large percentage of the offering. As to be expected the average quality of the well finished lambs was below the previous sale. The usual processor and restocker orders were in place.

Despite the reduction in quality there was little change in the market for trade and heavy weight lambs. The plainest of the restocker lambs sold to a

cheaper trend. The better quality lambs to restockers saw a firm to dearer market trend of up to \$8/head.

Merino sheep skin values played a role in a dearer market for Merino sheep. The crossbred ewes saw a firm to cheaper market trend with the heavy weights least affected.



Weekly Wool Market Report



February 23rd - It was another extremely solid week for the wool market resulting in the Eastern Market Indicator finishing at its highest ever weekly closing level and just short of January's all time high. Almost all categories gained ground for the week with up to 50 cents rises for the medium Merino types.

The 20 to 22 micron indicators closed at fresh all time highs with the 20 and 21 micron indicators rapidly closing the price premium gap that the finer types had opened up in recent times. The Aussie dollar shedding 1.3 cents against the US during the week certainly would have helped the market however the EMI closed the week 17 cents cheaper

when looked at in US dollars. 39,429 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 5.4%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Seatech and PJ Morris with the top four accounting for over 50% of the Merino Fleece offering. Next week's national offering has increased by around 5,000 bales above last week's forecast with Sydney scheduled as a designated Superfine sale. Some caution is becoming evident in the forward market with buyers reluctant to trade at the physicals historically high levels.

Build it and they will come

My little family and I recently moved to the New England region to escape the hustle and bustle of city life. Our family of seasoned and budding adventurers have travelled to Europe and New Zealand to seek spectacular scenery, country roads and traffic free rail trails to cycle on. While exploring my new city of Armidale and the New England region I was astounded to discover the underutilised community asset of the potential New England Rail Trail.

I am writing to encourage support for the creation of the New England Rail Trail. I believe it would be a great recreational resource for the New England region and source of future sustained tourist revenue. When complete the

210km New England Rail Trail would be the longest rail trail in this region of Australia. The famous New Zealand Otago Central Rail trail, the yard stick for rail trail potential in the Antipodes, is only 150km long.

The New England Rail Trail has many potential features that could see it become the Australian equivalent of the Otago Central Rail Trail. Climatically New England is similar to Otago and far more conducive to cycling in most parts of the year. Geologically New England region is easily equivalent to the Otago region with its exposed rock outcroppings and high alpine flora. The paralleling system of roads that enables users to travel sections of choice and visit towns for resupply, is also similar to Otago. In regards to history I think NERT easily surpasses the

Otago Rail Trail. Due to the short time of inactivity on the Northern Rail line so much remnant infrastructure remains. This infrastructure, if retained, would be a huge draw card for train and rail trail enthusiasts.

The Brisbane Valley Rail trail is a great example to hold up for rail trail potential in this region of Australia. Even though not yet complete, local communities along the trail hold sporting events, fun runs, animal trail walks and religious reenactments along the length of the BVRT. In my years of involvement with the BVRT I've seen resources and business grow beside the trail. In my opinion NERT could easily surpass the BVRT in potential community use and involvement. New interest in the rail lines history would bolster the existing community historic

groups that remain along its length.

Rail trail enthusiasts that are not locals, are predominantly interested in travelling along corridors of rail history and spend time exploring historic features. Enthusiasts travel great distances to experience a rail trail. They are mindful of local landowners privacy and grazing stock security. They come to explore and celebrate the history and scenery of a region. I know this because I am one of those rail trail enthusiasts and I've already started exploring around Armidale, Guyra and the New England region and spending my dollars there every weekend.

New England, if the trains are not returning, and you build it, they WILL come.

Community Small Grants Program now open

The Armidale Regional Council's 2017/2018 Community Small Grants Program is now accepting applications until 5pm Friday March 30, 2018.

The grants program covers the whole Armidale Regional Local Government Area and the Mayor Cr Simon Murray strongly encourages local not-for-profit organisations from the region to submit an application for up to \$1000.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for not-for-profit organisations to seek support for a local program or initiative," said Cr Murray. "Council is keen to support proposals from across the area that meet the criteria and address community need."

Council can provide assistance through the small grants program for applicants seeking up to \$1000. Local not-for-profit organisations are encouraged to apply however Council would like to remind the community that not-for-profit groups who already receive regular funding from Council are ineligible to apply for a Community Small Grant.

The aim of the Community Small Grants Program is to:

- Provide support for local programs or initiatives which are considered beneficial to the community and which address community needs.
- Support the development of special initiatives or programs which demonstrate community cooperation between a number of local groups and organisations.

Tenterden bridge almost complete

Work on the \$1.06 million Tenterden Road Bridge replacement west of Guyra is progressing well.

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall inspected the construction recently and commended Armidale Regional Council crews on the quality of work so far.

"The project involves replacing the old and dangerous single-lane timber bridge with a two-lane concrete structure over Georges Creek along Tenterden Road, as well as new bridge approaches for the newly aligned road," Mr Marshall said.

"The new bridge abutments and piers have been constructed and the girders, deck and guard railing installed – now council staff are busily building the new bridge approaches on either side.

"It is an impressive sight and I

cannot wait to see the bridge completed soon and the first vehicles driving across it."

Mr Marshall said the new two-lane bridge would dramatically improve safety and increase productivity for local companies by opening up the area to heavier freight vehicles that previously couldn't use the old crossing.

"The bridge will eliminate a potential detour of 67 kilometres for heavy vehicles, shortening travel distances and lowering freight costs," he said.

The \$1.06 million Tenterden Road Bridge replacement project received \$510,000 from the NSW Government's Fixing Country Roads program, \$530,000 Australian Government as well as \$20,000 from Armidale Regional Council, which is managing the works.

Farmers bark at new dog breeding rules

NSW Farmers is concerned that the fundamental position of working dogs on farms is under threat with proposed dog breeding regulations. The NSW Department of Primary Industries has developed draft Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (Breeding Dogs) Standards and Guideline in response to animal welfare incidents on puppy farms but they will apply to all dog breeders.

NSW Farmers has strongly opposed these proposed regulations applying to working dog breeders as they are not feasible. Chair

of the NSW Farmers Animal Welfare Committee James Jackson said that the proposed regulations are completely unrealistic for small breeders, and they do not differentiate between working and companion dog operations.

"These regulations are intended to address health and welfare concerns with puppy farms. The regulations focus on large commercial operations and will require all breeders to have completed specific training courses, have specialised housing facilities and de-

tailed management procedures," Mr Jackson said.

"The detailed requirements will force working dog breeders to either stop operating or continue in fear of being found non-compliant, with these overly bureaucratic requirements".

"We are deeply concerned that the vital role of working dogs in agriculture has not been considered. There is no recognition of the importance of working dogs nor that these dogs are bred for a specific purpose unlike companion dogs."

"NSW Farmers is calling

on NSW Department of Primary Industries to exempt working dogs from these requirements, and recognise the difference between working and companion dogs."

"Working dogs need to be treated different, otherwise they will continue to be tangled in puppy farm regulations".

The DPI will review feedback provided to a recently concluded stakeholder consultation process and consider whether amendments are required.
