Bank closure 'disappointing'

An automatic telling machine will be the only thing that remains when the Commonwealth Bank closes its Guyra branch in May.

This is not the first time that the Commonwealth Bank has shut up shop. As part of the first wave of bank closures it withdrew services in 1996.

Following that closure Colonial State Bank moved in to the premises, and when they were taken over the Comonwealth returned.

Longstanding customer Greg Mitchell says it was a 'kick in the guts' to arrive home this week to a letter in the mail which effectively puts an end to a family and business connection that stretches back nearly 70 years.

"Our connection with the Commonwealth Bank started back in the 1950s and it is very disappointing to see this happen," Mr Mitchell said.

"All those years we have been able to walk in the door and the staff have always been great, but now they will be gone - you can't talk to an ATM and I don't want to be forced to go to Armidale.

"This will be bad for the town – we are losing our iden-

tity and our community connections.

"Years ago we used to look up to the Bank Manager, and now we don't even know who they are.

"When I find out who to ring I will let them know what I think, but I don't think it will make any difference."

Bank closure 'the last straw'

The closure is the latest in a series of banking cutbacks to hit the town. Westpac closed their in store branch in 2016 and the NAB has reduced its trading hours to just three days.

Regional Australia Bank has also reduced their trading hours and all three blame the move to online banking.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall last week called on customers in rural and regional NSW to reconsider their ties to the big four banks – with branch closures showing a lack of interest in the bush.

"Last year the big four collectively recorded a profit of more than \$31.5 billion. Despite that, during that same period they closed 38 branches across regional Australia," Mr Marshall said.

"Our big four banks are amongst the most stable and profitable financial institutions in the world thanks to the considerable support and policy certainty offered in difficult economic times by the Australian Government and Australian taxpayers.

"However, when times are good, they have no compunction in gouging resources, branches and employees from our small regional communities which can least afford it."

Mr Marshall said the Commonwealth Bank's recent decision to close its Guyra branch was the last straw.

"How does a farmer bank a cheque using a phone app? How does a grandmother use a phone app if she wants to deposit money into her grandson's account as he is heading to university? How does a small business owner get advice on restructuring their debt to stay afloat on their tablet device? Those customers will face a two-hour round trip to access basic banking services," Mr Marshall said.

"Small businesses are the backbone of regional communities and without local bank managers, locals cannot access the critical financial information they need."

A representative from the CBA said that the decision was not an easy one, and they know some members of the community will be disappointed.

"We have seen, year after year, that fewer customers use this branch, There has been a steady decline in transactions as our customers choose to use other banking channels like online and mobile.

"Over the past five years, the number of transactions completed at our Guyra branch have declined by nearly 40 per cent.

"As a result, we have made a decision to close our Guyra branch. We wanted to give customers in the area as much notice as possible so we can talk with them about their banking options. The branch's last day of operation will be 18 May 2018.

Guyna Sheep & Lamb Sale **Market Report**

March 7th - There was a varding of 4485 lambs and 2295 sheep at Guyra last week. Lamb numbers almost doubled with increased supplies of well finished trade weights and a few heavy weights.

There was a large supply of plain condition lambs suitable to restockers. The usual buyers were in attendance and the southern restocker orders were active with the increased supplies. Demand for the well finished trade weight lambs increased and resulted in dearer trends, up to \$7/head.

Heavy weights saw a firm to slightly dearer market while the extra heavy weights carried plenty of weight, with none to make a comparison to from the previous sale. Those southern restockers were active throughout and showed greater interest in heavier weights.

The market trend for those better lambs remained firm, while the plainer light weights sold to a cheaper trend of \$4 to \$5/head and more in places. There were larger numbers of light weight first cross lambs penned.

The sheep offering comprised a large percentage of light and medium weight Merino ewes, most carrying at least 40mm skins. The overall weight of the offering was down as a result with very few heavy crossbred ewes penned. Market trends were generally dearer with increased demand. Skin values also improved, however did not relate to actual wool values. Lam

March 9th - Coming off the back of multiple new highs set last week was never going to be easy. The larger national offering and the Aussie dollar also jumping over 1 cent against the US helped to prevent any new records being set in the wool market this week. Losses were mainly restricted to the first day of sales with the market cheaper from the outset, especially for wool carrying a higher percentage of vegetable matter or showing a weakness in staple strength. Only minor movements were recorded of the final day of sales. 40.609 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate climbing to 10.8%. Major buy-



ers included Seatech, Techwool and Lempriere. ABARE released new five year forecasts for wool this week and considering the current near record prices being offered it makes for interesting reading. ABARE is predicting the seasonal average of the EMI will continue to rise with a predicted average of 2015 c/kg by 2022/23 season. This would equate to a level 10% higher than last week's record level and lift the value of Australia's wool exports well above the 5 billion dollar mark.
