OPINION: Issue is the closure of the corridor

How can anyone conduct a business case/feasibility study on a rail trail? You can only draw on the success or failure of other rail trails here and overseas. Making a comparison with what may happen with a Permanent Way destroying cycle track on the Great Northern line north of Armidale is not a panacea for justifying a rail trail.

Primarily the issue is the closure of the corridor north of Armidale. The NERT group wishing to establish a rail trail is secondary. Armidale Regional Council with its support for a rail trail between Armidale and Ben Lomond is totally ignoring the transport needs of the rate payers and communities in the north of this newly formed regional council.

Closure of the Great Northern railway corridor involves the public loss of tenure of the 214 kilometre section from Armidale to the Queensland border (Wallangarra) and any discussion on the issue should include all councils and communities along its entire length. It would appear ARC have decided not to go ahead with its controversial \$50k rate payer burdening business case study of a NE rail trail but has committed to a so-called desktop study with undisclosed costings.

The Department of Premier & Cabinet consultation report, independent surveys and polls have clearly shown that there is not overwhelming support for a rail trail, as required by government. A poll from the Armidale Express is currently running at over 80% of people being in favour of the reinstatement of train services not a rail trail.

These facts should have made it easy for council to withdraw from any support for a rail trail, this could have been done months ago. To burden the rate payers with the ongoing costs involved with the corridor after closure is a total and disrespectful nonsense, particularly when council is already showing an \$800k deficit racing towards \$1million by June this year. This is what forced amalgamation has brought upon us!!

There have been many attempts from various bodies to use the line for transport and tourist ventures over a long period (some 30 years) only to be blocked by a series of state government's showing little or no interest in regional rail transport particularly in northern NSW. Meanwhile the federal government is pouring in excess of \$10billion (sure to blow out by billions) into the Inland Rail Link from Melbourne to Brisbane, creating a perfect opportunity for us to push for the reinstatement of freight and passenger services on the GNR complementing the new line to our west. This would grow and develop into a viable rail network throughout the whole state and of course the nation, invigorating this region and many others, far more than any rail trail will ever do. Could this be BRAINS FOR TRAINS working? It certainly isn't KICKING A DEAD HORSE as referred to in the Have Your Say section of the Guyra Gazette.

time is that while CBA is exiting, Regional Australia Bank is very keen to stay put and is looking to regional communities like Guyra to support this endeavor.

Regional Australia Bank's commitment to Guyra was applauded by the Member for Northern Tablelands Mr. Adam Marshall, who also attended the breakfast.

Last month Mr Marshall launched a blistering attack on the country's banking establishment, condemning their increasing withdrawal from regional Australia and describing Commonwealth Bank's decision to close its Guyra branch as the last straw. During the breakfast, Mr Marshall spoke of rewarding businesses who contribute to the community with loyalty. He also spoke of how we can be guilty of not making a stand when we experience a lack of commitment from businesses because it may be hard, but as a regional population, we have the power to force change.



A bit of TLC for TSRs

Travelling Stock Reserves (TSRs) have long been a valuable resource for farmers when times get tough. Now, the stretches of grazing land alongside our roads and property boundaries are getting extra attention under the Protecting Biodiversity on TSRs in the Northern Tablelands Project.

The project surveyed and assessed existing vegetation on the TSRs, then applied a targeted herbicide spray to cull invasive woody weeds. This treatment will encourage the return of native grasses and protection of vulnerable or endangered ecological communities, such as the New England Peppermint and Box Gum Grassy Woodlands.

Northern Tablelands LLS has secured \$99,600 to deliver the project over three years, assisted by the NSW Government through its Environmental Trust. The project team has identified 40 sites on TSRs on over 1177 hectares, to eradicate invasive weeds such as pyracantha, hawthorn and mimosa.

Northern Tablelands LLS Project Officer Sandy Hodgens has been coordinating the program on the ground. He said they have just completed the second year of the project at Moredun TSR north-west of Guyra and

areas along the Strathbogie Road near Glen Innes.

TSRs are a public asset which Northern Tablelands LLS manages for production, social, cultural and environmental outcomes and continuously works to maintain and improve them for the benefit of the whole community.

"TSRs provide a wide range of environmental benefits including habitat for native animals, shade and shelter, buffering waterways, enabling pollination, protecting threatened and endangered species and improving soil health," he explained.

The Protecting Biodiversity on TSRs project has also improved the productivity of the targeted TSRs and has restricted weed spread to neighbouring properties. Sandy said they had to curtail this year's spraying by a fortnight, due to the unseasonal heat which triggered early defoliation of some target species. Nevertheless, the team is very pleased with the project's benefit to local Endangered Ecological Communities.

"The result is just outstanding and anyone who has driven past one of the particular sites between Guyra and Tingha has noticed the progress. We have received lots of comments and positive feedback about the effectiveness of the project this year."

Families to benefit from added early learning support

Guyra families are set for more support to access early childhood education and care, backed by new funding from the Coalition Government.

Member for New England Barnaby Joyce welcomed the support for much needed local child care and early learning services.

"The Coalition Government is providing vital funding for 11 child care and early learning services throughout the New England delivering added security and support for local families," Mr Joyce said.

Families with children attending the Guyra Preschool and Long Day Care Centre will be eligible under the new system.

The switchover to the Turnbull Government's new child care and early learning system starts on July 2nd, but urged families not to wait to the last minute to take action.

Weekly Wool

April 27th - Tuesday's opening saw the recent upward movement continue with gains of up to 30 cents for the Merino types and 40 cent jumps in the Crossbred sector.

With the Anzac day holiday on Wednesday sales resumed on Thursday with a slightly more cautious tone. 10 cent falls were recorded in the Merino sector however the Crossbred sector continued to kick with some large gains made. 21 to 25 micron types hit new record highs on Tuesday whilst the Eastern Market Indicator at 1846 is also at its highest recorded end of week level.

Market Report

41,077 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 3.6%. Major buyers included Techwool, Seatech and Tianvu.

A sharp fall by the Aussie dollar against the US no doubt helped the market with the Eastern Market Indicator actually dipping by 27 cents when looked at in US dollars.

The volume of wool expected to be offered next week has risen by 5,000 bales on last week's forecast but at just over 43,000 bales in total it remains a very manageable figure. Forward market prices were very solid for short dated contracts but fall away sharply into Spring and beyond.

Armidale Cattle

April 26th - The Anzac day public holiday brought about a large reduction in numbers. Young cattle and cows made up the bulk of the offering with limited supplies in the other categories. The quality of the offering was only fair to good, while the condition was mostly on the lean side.

There was reduced competition in all categories due mostly to the low numbers. Market trends varied through the young cattle with light weight weaner steers to restockers sold firm to slightly dearer with the large price change mostly quality related.

Light weight weaner heifers sold to a dearer trend of as much as 20c/kg as restockers took to good quality light weight cattle to reduce their buy in price. Medium weight vealer and weaner heifers sold to a cheaper trend of up to 14c/kg. Medium weight yearling steers sold to a cheaper trend for a fairly plain quality penning.

A good supply of heavy weight feeder steers sold only slightly cheaper for the well-bred lines, more so for the plainer quality lots. Yearling heifers sold to cheaper trends. Secondary quality young cattle failed to attract much demand from either restockers or feedlotters. There were too few heavy grown steers to quote. Grown heifers generally sold to cheaper trends.

Demand from processors was weaker for cows with market trends cheaper, up to 20c/kg on the better cows. Very plain condition cows attracted little competition, while restockers were active on joined cows in store condition.

Team Guyra conquer Tour de Rocks

The 7th Tour de Rocks ride is done and dusted with a large contingent of Guyra riders participating. This year's Guyra team had 21 riders and 8 fantastic support people who rode 258km in three days from Armidale to South West Rocks.

Team organizer Jenni Jackson has extended a huge congratulations to everyone who participated in this year's event.

"This is an amazing event for our Guyra team and all the riders have all put in an amazing amount of training," Jenni said. "One of our riders was heard saying she thinks 'Guyra is the fittest team'.

"This year the team gave around \$8000 in fund raising to the event and would sincerely like to thank the Guyra community, families and friends for their continued support."

Overall there was about 320 riders and 80 support people in this year's event, who give up their time and do this great event because of the cause. Generally, around \$250,00 is raised of which \$100,000 goes to two cancer research projects in Sydney and the remainder of the money goes to helping support cancer sufferers and programs in the areas where the riders have come from.

Trains are the Future?

Very Fast Trains in particular would seem to be a good choice in Australia. Every few years, politicians make noises about creating such a service, but as yet we have nothing. The estimated > \$100 billion (citing http://www.abc.net.au/news/201 6-04-11/knight-our-ridiculouslyslow-road-to-a-very-fasttrain/7316778) to create such a network is probably a fair reason why.

Cheap air travel also limits the capacity for such a service to repay itself. Looking further out, electric aircraft and self-driving vehicles could also change the economics and feasibility.

The line north of Armidale ceased operating in 1988, so if the past is any indication of the future it seems unlikely that there will be a resumption of service for many years to come. The line is doing very little at the moment other than reminding us of the past, and importantly reserving that corridor for a possible future return to service.

A rail trail doesn't mean that the line is closed for good. It just means that the area (currently owned by the government / ARTC) can be enjoyed by a wider audience. It preserves the corridor for the future return of a train service; and in the interim offers the many benefits that a rail trail brings. I've seen them first hand having flown to NZ just to ride the Central Otago trail over five days.

So yes, trains may be the future; but not the present. While we wait for that possible future, why not try a rail trail if the opportunity presents?

Council submitted the funding application on behalf of the homestead management and liaised closely with the NSW Member for
