Trips north hit roadblock

The popular train rides that operate during the Lamb and Potato Festival are hoping to add an extra trip to their itinerary, but will have to overcome safety concerns before rides north of town can go ahead.

While they have in principle support from John Holland Rail, repeated approaches to council have been blocked by the Traffic Advisory Committee.


Operations Manager for the Guyra Antique Machinery Group Ron Lockyer said that they will continue to push for the ride to be extended.

"Our train rides are popular, especially during the annual Lamb and Potato Festival, and passengers have often asked for us to take them north as well," he said.

"We would like to be able to go up as far as the 626 peg, which is opposite the old abattoirs. It would be something different for those who are regulars and also an extra tourist attraction which I think Guyra needs."

At the 2018 festival, 1925 passengers were transported on the train and Mr Lockyer said that he thinks that would increase significantly if the extension is approved.

However, the Traffic Advisory Committee denied the groups most recent request until such time as the machinery group addresses legal and safety concerns. One of their suggestions was for lights and bells to be installed, which Mr



Lockyer said would be cost prohibitive.

"We think that we can make it work and have already considered the best way to do it. The VRA have agreed to man the crossing and we would pull up and wait for the traffic. We will keep trying and hope to be able to come to some arrangement with the traffic committee that would satisfy their requirements."

A space for all at The Hub

Communities at large have a growing need for an Advocacy services and Guyra is no different. Guyra's Neighbourhood Centre, The Hub at Guyra is not funded to provide advocacy, but do not turn anyone away.

Coordinator Chris Hietbrink said that many people need an advocate for medical, legal, telco, utility, Centrelink, document completion and other services.

However, to undertake this role, community members need to give written approval for individual staff members at The Hub at Guyra to speak for them.

"A consent form needs to be completed and you need to inform the other party as well," she said. "If the advocacy is conducted by telephone then the consent is given verbally for each call, but if you need someone to complete or forward documents or communicate with another person on your behalf then you also need to inform the other party and they will likely have you also sign a consent form. This authority can be revoked at any time."

The Hub at Guyra is also home to many community and service organisations such as Guyra Family Support Services (who provide a support services for families with children aged 0-18 in the family unit), Supported Playgroup, Aboriginal Services, Probation and Parole, Alcoholics Anonymous, OCTEC Limited (who provide vocational education and training, disability support and employment services), Peak Psychology, Pathfinders Youth Services, North & Northwest Community Legal Services (free legal services), women's and men's services, family contact visits, etc. as well as our after school Youth Drop-In on Wednesdays during school term.

Many other people use the space for one-off or infrequent use. Of course, the staff are always available for you to drop in and have a cuppa or just to have a chat if you are feeling lonely or sad — or happy too.

Currently The Hub at Guyra is awaiting the outcome of their application for funding under the Stronger Country Communities Funding. This application came in at Priority #5 by Armidale Regional Council and the organisation is grateful for the support of Council staff and The Hon. Adam John Marshall, MP during the application process.

The money will provide a unique Guyra space with offices for service providers, a reception area, a large kitchen, washroom facilities, a large room for use as an exercise space, group meeting, youth activities, playgroup, etc. There will be a board room, a computer room and extensive storage space for equipment used by playgroup, youth, exercise and other groups with the total space is disability friendly. The design is sympathetic to the heritage of the building and plans are available to view in The Hub at Guyra of-

The neighbourhood centre is open Tuesday – Friday 10am-2pm and everyone is welcome to this friendly space at 160 Bradley Street, Guyra.

Lambs killed after truck rolls

An accident last week has resulted in the deaths of 83 lambs after the truck transporting them rolled just west of Guyra. The crossbred lambs were part of a mob of 430 which had been picked up from a Wandsworth property and were being transported to the abattoir at Kempsey.

The accident occurred at around 12.30pm on Tuesday May 8th, when the vehicle failed to negotiate a sweeping bend on the Guyra to Tingha Rd. The driver of the truck, a 30 year old man from Tamworth, sustained minor injuries and was able to free himself.

Emergency services and council staff assisted in the cleanup, with the road partially closed for most of the afternoon. Police and RMS Inspectors are investigating the circumstances surrounding the crash.

Auction a last resort for unpaid rates

Armidale Regional Council will put almost 60 properties up for auction in September to recover unpaid rates. A total of 59 properties have been listed to go under the auctioneer's hammer.

Council's Interim Chief Executive Officer, Chris Rose, said the owners of all the properties received numerous requests to pay the outstanding rates and charges or come to a satisfactory arrangement to settle their debt to Council.

The combined value of the 59 properties is \$748,300; roughly a quarter of the total outstanding rates and charges owed to Council, which stood at \$2.455 million at the end of June 2017.

Among the properties listed for Saturday's sale, the highest amount outstanding is \$75,811 for a property in Armidale. The lowest amount is \$2,391 for a property in Brushy Creek. Some of the properties are small parcels of land without dwelling entitlements.

Notices advertising Council's

intention to auction the properties will appear in the local press, including details of the properties.

"Property owners are advised to contact Council if they are falling behind in paying rates," Mr Rose said.

"We can work out an agreeable payment plan or, in some cases, they can apply for hardship rate relief.

"Plus, rates can also be paid on a weekly, fortnightly or monthly basis via direct debit, rather than waiting until the quarterly bill."

All NSW councils have a similar policy addressing debt recovery for unpaid rates.

They are bound by the NSW Local Government Act 1993 (Section 713) which gives councils the power to sell land where rates have not been paid for more than five years or, for vacant land, when the amount overdue exceeds the current land valuation provided by the Valuer General.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

May 16th - Lamb numbers declined, while there were a few more sheep penned. The quality of the lambs was mixed with some very well finished heavy and extra heavy weights alongside a fair supply of plainer condition lots. The usual buyers were in attendance with all processors operating. The reduced supply of lambs suitable to the restockers

saw less competition.

An improved quality penning of medium weight lambs suitable to restock sold to a dearer trend. The plainer restocker lambs also sold to a dearer trend, however the variation in quality was not as great this week. Trade weight 3 score lambs saw a firm to \$2/head dearer market trend.

Heavy lambs of mixed quality

sold to a cheaper trend, up to \$5/head with some sales remaining firm. The extra heavy weight lambs sold to a dearer trend of as much as \$10/head with some quality improvement also.

Once again there was a strong representation of full wool Merino sheep penned. The condition and weight varied, although there were limited numbers of

heavy weight sheep. Restockers bouyed by the improvement in the wool market were active. Processor demand was strong and resulted in dearer trends with strong gains for the full wool Merino sheep. There were vast price differences between the shorn Merino's and those carrying an inch and a half or more wool.

Weekly Wool Sales

May 18th - New records are not supposed to tumble on a daily basis but no one has told the wool market this fact in recent times. In a very similar performance to last week, gains were seen over both selling days, propelling the Eastern Market Indicator above 1900 cents for the first time.

All Merino micron indicators from 18 and broader have closed the week at record highs. 35,556 bales were sold nationally for the week with just 2.3% passed in. Competition from buyers is fierce with the majors for the week including Techwool, Fox & Lillie and Seatech.

National weekly upcoming

offerings are rapidly reducing at the same time as demand seems to have moved into high gear. The current uptrend in the market has surpassed all previous uptrends for both length of time and magnitude of the rise.

The Eastern Market Indicator is now sitting at a staggering 500 cents higher than what at the time was the last peak in June 2011. As global economic conditions continue to improve and reports that early stage processing stocks of wool remain low it's looking possible that we can hang onto these levels for some time.

Armidale Cattle Sale

May 17th - There was only a small increase in numbers. Vealers, yearlings and cows were well supplied. The majority of the vealers were more suited for restocking purposes. The overall quality and condition was mixed, quite a few showing the effects of the drought, while some of the cows showed no sign. The full field of buyers were back and operating and this had a significant effect on the market in some categories.

Steer vealers to restockers over 200kg sold on a firm to cheaper market trend, however an improvement in quality had a positive effect on price change. There was a large variation in the price range, mostly breed related. Heifer vealers and weaners sold to a dearer trend with averages improving by 12c to 13c/kg with the

increased competition contributing. Yearling steers to restock and feed saw improvements of as much as 30c/kg with the increased competition from both feedlotters and restockers. The biggest gains were in the yearling heifers with the medium and heavy weights showing improvements of 50c to 60c/kg and more in places. There was some quality improvement also.

There were too few well finished heavy grown steers and heifers to quote. The cow market saw a dearer trend with the well finished 3 and 4 scores 11c to 13c/kg dearer, while the plainer condition cows and especially the very plain cows experienced greater improvements. The limited supply of bulls also saw the benefit of increased competition.

Dot Vickery spent over a decade relentlessly bending ears and banging on doors to make this facility a reality. There were also council members past and present there who should be congratulated for keeping this facility from being moth-balled despite the challenges they faced.

New three-month NSW gun amnesty starts 1 July

I would like to urge those across the region with an unregistered or unwanted firearm to take advantage of the next NSW Firearm Amnesty, from 1 July to 30 September 2018. Last year's National Firearm Amnesty netted almost 25,000 firearms from 7,277 individuals during the three-month campaign.

Firearms and firearm-related items can be surrendered under amnesty at approved drop-off points, which include licensed firearm dealers, mobile stations and police stations. Contact the NSW Police Force Firearms Registry on 1300 362 562 for assistance.

Guyra gun club draws a bead on state government funding

Guyra Gun Club members were terrific hosts when I visited their club and announced of an almost \$8,000 grant from the NSW Government to upgrade its toilet and shower facilities.

Rail corridor and rail trail proposal update

The rail line north of Armidale to the Queensland border remains open and there are no plans that I am aware of by the Transport Minister to introduce legislation into the State Parliament to change the status quo.

As detailed in the recently released NSW Department of Premier and Cabinet (DPC) report on the rail trail proposal consultations, there are a number of matters and questions about the proposal which must be addressed before the proposal can progress. Issues such as, the cost to construct the trail, annual cost to maintain the trail, biosecurity, legal access to properties and public roads across the trail and grazing stock in the rail corridor have to be explored and resolved.

I understand Armidale Regional Council is considering whether it will take on the project and develop a business case, as per the DPC report, and address the outstanding issues. This will have a large bearing on whether the proposal proceeds or not.

It is worth noting that the two live rail trail projects in the State which have secured Federal and State Government funding to proceed, are both being driven and delivered by the respective local councils.




