End of the line for Burgess family

Burgess Garage will close its doors on June 30, bringing to an end four generations and almost 99 years of doing business with the local community.

For all of those years it has been a true family run operation which began with Herbert Burgess and his partner Arthur Gibson in 1919. Over the years, all of Herbert's children Betty (Steele), Boyd, Wendy (Walker), Nola (Mulligan) and Caroline (Thompson) were actively involved in the business at some stage.

Boyd and wife Laurice eventually took over Burgess Garage, with Betty and husband Harold moving down the street to take over the Fourways Service Station. Greg took the helm in 1977 working alongside his mother Laurice and wife Jo, with daughter Brooke joining in 1995.

Over the years the business has dealt with the changing face of the rural community and weathered good times and bad. It also saw disaster when a fire destroyed all but the façade in 1967, only to rise again from the ashes.

Eventually all things come to an end and the family have now made the difficult deci-

sion to sell the business. Brooke had hoped to continue her association with NRMA Insurance, however that decision was taken out of her hands with the Guyra agency one of 75 that will close at the end of June.

Greg said that he has mixed feelings about closing the doors, but believes it is time to

move on. The business has been listed for sale either as a going concern or for new opportunities.

"Guyra has changed over the years but there is still great potential and there has been a fair bit of interest so hopefully the doors will reopen soon," Greg said.

"We have had great support

from the community over the years and I will miss seeing all our regular customers. There is a lot of family history here and my best memories are of being here with my father and then seeing my own kids, Brooke and Beth, running around here just like I did."



Mayor's Message

Another positive chapter in the Armidale region's multiculturalism came under the spotlight during World Refugee Day.

It was wonderful to be among the approximately 100 community members who attended Armidale's Belgrave Cinema on 20 June for a special screening of the documentary *The Staging Post*, about the remarkable achievements of Afghan refugees in Indonesia as they sought passage to Australia.

The audience had a rare opportunity to speak directly to the two stars of the film, providing further valuable insight to the plight and experiences of people who have fled their own country out of fear for their wellbeing and make an often perilous journey to our shores seeking safety.

The message was particularly poignant for our region as Settlement Services International, with support from Council,

assists Yazidi refugees to start a new life in the Armidale area. Approximately 29 Yazidi families, from northern Iraq and Syria, have so far relocated to the district through the

Humanitarian Settlement Program (HSP).

The excellent attendance and sentiments expressed by Wednesday night's audience was additional evidence of the fantastic way our community welcomes these latest newcomers and the other residents who have come from many other parts of the world.

One of the great strengths of this region is the vast variety of ethnic groups who are present and active in our community, bringing a diversity of cultures and experiences that adds colour, vibrancy, ideas and resilience.

Earlier that day, Council hosted a morning tea for about 50 Yazidi newcomers, as a further gesture to warmly welcome them and to get to know some of our newest residents.

As we help these Yazidi families make a new start in their lives, our thoughts also turn to some existing Armidale region residents experiences testing times. The ongoing drought is putting a financial and emotional squeeze on many local farming families.

However, there are a number of measures in place to provide some relief and I urge affected residents to make the most of this assistance.

A new Drought Assistance Fund was announced earlier this month by the Rural Assistance Authority, part of the NSW Department of Primary Industries.

Pipeline funding welcomed

A pipeline to provide a more secure town water supply to Guyra is a major step closer, following the project's inclusion in the 2018/19 State Budget released last week by the NSW Government.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Simon Murray welcomed the \$12.375 million allocation in the State Budget for the Malpas Dam to Guyra Pipeline.

"Council is extremely grateful the State Government has recognised the tremendous value of this project. Not only will it bring a more reliable water supply to existing residents and businesses, it is fantastic news for the whole Armidale region because this project will open the door for substantial economic development and job creation," Councillor Murray said.

"We have a number of horticultural industries on our doorstep and ready to invest in the area, just waiting for a more reliable water supply before they commit.

"The NSW Member for Northern Tablelands, Adam Marshall, lobbied tenaciously for this project and I applaud his long-running efforts to get it included in this budget."

The proposed 15km pipeline would have a capacity to carry up to 4.5 megalitres of water

to the Guyra township each day.

Malpas Dam also provides the town water supply for Armidale but has capacity to meet the needs of a much larger population. It is estimated the project will cost \$12.8 million but that figure will be finalised during the tender process, being considered at this week's Council's Ordinary Council Meeting

Time to talk Tingha poll

The result of community poll on a proposal to transfer Tingha and surrounds to the Inverell Shire will be high on the agenda when Armidale Regional Council holds the second Councillors' Cuppa in Tingha on Sunday 1 July.

The community information session, giving residents the chance to speak informally with their councillors, will be held in Tingha Town Hall from noon to 1.30pm.

Mayor Simon Murray said the outcome of the postal poll, asking residents whether they supported an amendment of the local government area boundary to shift Tingha and surrounding properties to the Inverell district, was sure to be a leading topic.

There are sure to be many other issues raised by residents during the Cuppa.

"The Cuppas are designed to allow residents to speak informally with councillors about whatever topic they want to raise," Cr Murray said.

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

June 20th - Guyra saw a slight increase in numbers of 355 to pen 2,000 lambs and 1,145 grown sheep. The season is impacting the number of light lambs available, going to both restock and process. Again, there was a good selection of heavy, well finished lambs and these sold to a pre-

mium. Heavy ewes also featured with good lines on offer. All the regular buyers attended, with both light lambs and sheep carrying good wool cover went back to southern store orders.

Light lambs to restockers sold to dearer trends of \$6, with light lambs to process showing improvements of \$15/head. Prices varied with trade lambs, with the better end seeing dearer trends, others slightly cheaper, with quality showing the change. Heavy lambs stood out to see upward trends of \$10, and extra heavy lambs to \$10/head, however, quality and weight the reason for

the change.

Grown sheep saw dearer trends throughout, with light ewes seeing improvements of \$10 to \$15/head. Medium weight ewes saw dearer trends, as did heavy ewes, the tops \$18/head better. The limited number of wethers saw trends cheaper.

Weekly Wool Sales

June 22nd - This week we saw the lowest national offering in over nine years with only 20,904 bales offered for sale. In addition to the small offering, the \$A fell sharply by 2 US cents compared to the last selling day last week. These factors and very strong demand from early stage processors pushed the market further upwards and into new territory with the Northern Market Indicator closing the week at 2110c/kg. The dominance of these early stage processors helps to confirm that their stock levels remain low. Existing supply, both domestically as greasy stock or overseas as processed stock remains at lower than normal levels. This is helping

to increase price pressures as buyers push each other to secure enough stock to satisfy their orders. Demand through the pipeline appears to be consistent. The fact the market in US c/kg terms has remained relatively stable over the last 4-6 weeks helps to support this theory. With smaller than normal offerings in the next 3 weeks it is difficult to see prices falling away to any great degree. The main potential for the market to get cheaper at present is the escalating concerns of a trade war between the US and China.

<u>Armidale Cattle Sale</u>

June 21st - There was a reduced penning of 770 very mixed quality cattle, 380 less. Good drafts of well-bred weaners came forward and a large reduction of yearling cattle. Not many grown steers and heifers were available and there was an increase in cow numbers. The regular gallery of buyers attended, with feeder buyers competing on the better bred categories.

Well-bred steer weaners sold to dearer trends of 15c, with some drafts of plainer quality types showing a reduction in prices of up to 40c/kg. Heavy weights to feed on saw substantially dearer trends of 30c/kg. Variation in quality saw a mixed market for medium weight heifers with these grades selling to cheaper trends of 12c/kg. Heifers to the trade were slightly dearer at 6c/kg.

A few grown heifers on offer and these sold to a dearer market. Light 1 score cows sold to dearer trends to restockers, with processors underpinning those categories. The trade was also strong on 2 and 3 score medium weight cows, improving 7c/kg. The best 3 score cows were 10c dearer, while bulls sold to cheaper trends of 8c/kg on the heavy weights.

What a great week for the Northern Tablelands. Hospitals, police stations, roads, schools, agricultural research and water infrastructure will see unprecedented levels of funding across the Northern Tablelands, thanks to a record-breaking 2018-19 NSW Budget.

A capital spend of almost \$259 million over the next 12 months surpasses last year's record spend of \$220 million in the electorate.

From our largest towns to our smallest villages, this budget will fund projects that will build and renew infrastructure, provide new and enhanced services and make life easier for residents across the Northern Tablelands.

We have the money we need to better our hospitals, invest in schools, secure water infrastructure, invest in roads around the electorate, build community facilities, upgrade youth resources, support agricultural research and development and improve police facilities.

This is all due to our proactive local councils and their communities working together and being persistent in lobbying government for their fair share for these important projects that will enhance our region.

Budget highlights for Guyra • \$12.3 million to construct critical water pipeline to drought-proof Guyra

The Guyra township's water woes will soon be a thing of the past with the Budget delivering \$12.375 million to construct a 15 kilometre pipeline from Malpas Dam to Guyra. The pipeline and associated water treatment infrastructure will permanently drought-proof the community and ensure continued growth in the region.

We've been lobbying for the pipeline's construction for almost two years and now Armidale Regional Council can proceed immediately with the critical water security project.

Guyra uses an average 423 mega litres of water each year, with demand steadily increasing, which far exceeds the town's current storage capacity of 277 mega litres.

The pipeline will expand that capacity to more than 740 mega litres, exceeding anticipated growth over the next 30 years.

The discoloured, foul smelling and poor quality potable water from the local water supply at Guyra has also been an ongoing issue and will now be resolved with the pipeline and new water treatment facilities.

Payroll tax relief for businesses

I welcomed the budget announcement that the Payroll Tax threshold will be lifted to \$1 million dollars. This will put money back into the bottom line of business owners around the region.

The threshold will rise to \$850,000 in 2018 19, \$900,000 in 2019 20, \$950,000 in 2020-21 and \$1 million in 2021-22.

Tourism Businesses to benefit














Mailman is still leading the Locals, but Jy is only 2 points behind. There's no leeway now for any 'off' weeks or slip-ups.
