Funding next step for rail trail

Passions ran high at Armidale Regional Council's October meeting, with opposing sides in the rail trail debate turning up to witness a vote about the future of the proposed New England Rail Trail.

The council meeting resolved to endorse the development of a rail trail, subject to securing funding.

Speaking in favour of a recommendation before council in support of moving forward with the proposed rail trail, Cr Peter Bailey said the alternative is the continuation of 30-year abandonment of the rail corridor.

"For once in my lifetime the state government is flush with money – it is up to us to go forward," Cr Bailey said.

"This debate has soldiered on for a long time and we are all well aware of both sides of argument. This is a now project, this is retail measure we can take to help move forward to help revitalise Guyra."

ARC Mayor Simon Murray said that the consultant's feasibility report gives council confidence a rail trail on the New England corridor could be financially viable and a sig-



nificant drawcard for this region, as well as a recreation and health asset for residents.

"Its favourable findings give us a solid platform to pursue government funding and to take our investigations to the next step.

"That will include a detailed business case study and consultation with the community, now we have a much clearer picture of the proposed project, its estimated costs and potential benefits for the region."

"It's important to note this is not a choice between trains or a rail trail. In the approximately 30 years since rail services operated in the corridor, there has been no viable proposition to restore rail operations on that line and the State Government has firmly

indicated it was highly unlikely any train services would be viable in the foreseeable future."

The consultant's plan states the NSW Government "has clearly indicated" the railway corridor would remain in public ownership if it was converted to a rail trail.

Cr Murray said that given that scenario, the responsible action by Council is to explore alternative uses for the incredibly scenic corridor and the wonderful assets along its route.

DPI Rural Women's Network Project Officer, Emma Regan said the Honour roll is a vital way to recognise the unsung heroes in our community.

"It's extremely important that we celebrate the valuable work of volunteers, from the provision of everyday services to their assistance in times of emergency, volunteers are the bedrock of our rural communities," she said.

"The people recognised are the powerhouses of their communities, who get all the jobs done that many of us take for granted. What all of these women have in common are their energy, their kindness and enthusiasm."

Artworks the main attraction

Guyra Central School students have been celebrated for their outstanding artworks to feature in an upgrade of their town's main street.

A ceremony was held as part of last Thursday's Armidale Regional Council meeting, to present students Bronte Stanley, Rogue Stannard and Colleen Pearson with certificates of recognition for their artworks submitted to the Guyra Main Street Redevelopment Public Art Competition.

Bronte received an individual certificate for her magpie illustration, while Rogue was recognised for his cockatoo design. It is proposed their designs will be used for murals on a new bus shelter, street shop or public toilets. Colleen's wonderful selection of photographs will be used in a collage graphic to wrap around

The certificates were presented by the Chair of Council's Arts & Cultural Advisory Committee, Councillor Margaret O'Connor, who said the judging panel was thrilled by the quality and creativity of entries.

"Council is hoping to work with a public artist to transform the artworks into public art designs to be incorporated into new infrastructure for the main street redevelopment," Cr O'Connor said.

"The project is also an opportunity for senior students to learn the principles of creating public art. Local artists Brian Irving and Kay Smith provided valuable mentoring support for the students."

Central school students worked on their designs over two terms, under the guidance of art teacher Clea Townsend and Principal Michelle Nicholson. The senior students created designs of two local iconic animals, the echidna and cockatoo, to be incorporated into footpath pavers.

A combined work by the primary school students will be utilised for a stained glass window graphic and will wrap around new street bins.

Triple treat for Neighbourhood Centre

Guyra's Neighbourhood Centre, The Hub at Guyra, will get a \$400,000 upgrade and extension, allowing it to expand its services and increase its reach to people in need of critical support and advocacy.

The funding from the NSW government will allow for the a 330 square metre addition along the building's rear and side creating a range of new spaces and amenities, effectively tripling the operational space.

Member for Northern Table lands Adam Marshall said that the current building lacks essential modern conveniences and this funding will address that issue.

"The neighbourhood centre is a safe, neutral space for the community to get help or advice about accessing other programs to help them. This funding is effectively future proofing this organisation for its community."

Centre co-ordinator Chris

Hietbrink said the project would see the space triple in size for community use but also provide some essential amenities like a dedicated kitchen.

"The space will include three offices with space for service providers who are here weekly, fortnightly and monthly, a boardroom, and a new office for our own services which will house our IT and reception systems," Mrs Hietbrink said. "But there will also be a new disabilities toilet and shower and men's and women's bathrooms, and a kitchen.

Mrs Hietbrink said most people didn't understand what Neighbourhood Centres do in their communities.

"It's a community hub and it's one of the most successful programs and provides a meeting place and a facility for so many groups and services and community programs," she said.

"This includes a range from psychology, disabilities recruitment, parental, TAFE, Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous, legal services, and youth and family support. Anyone can come and use our space and some use it more regularly than others."

Mrs Hietbrink said it was hoped the renovation and extension work would get underway soon, after a tender process for the works. The next target for The Hub will be to source equipment and furnishings to fit-out the new spaces.

The heritage building is council owned, built over 100 years ago as the school master's residence.

Mayor's Message

A feasibility study into a possible rail trail along the disused rail corridor between Armidale and Glen Innes was endorsed by last week's Council meeting, opening the door for more detailed investigations.

The New England Rail Trail plan, compiled by an independent consultant, found a rail trail on the disused New England rail corridor has the scenery and historic features to be a major attraction for visiting and local users and could be expected to pay for itself within a few years.

Rail trails are shared-use paths recycled from abandoned railway corridors, providing a safe and inviting place for walking, cycling or horse riding away from motorised vehicles. They capitalise on the scenic beauty of the route, the historic railway infrastructure and other attractions to lure visitors to the area, while providing a safe path for families and other locals to exercise or commute.

Masterclass for history enthusiasts

Heritage and history enthusiasts from throughout the region have received expert advice about curating their collections, during a workshop hosted by Council on Thursday.

Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences (MAAS) Curator Damian McDonald provided a full-day workshop designed to help regional organisations maintain community-owned collections.

Representatives from the Armidale Folk Museum and Hillgrove Museum – which are both administered by Council - were joined by members from the Armidale, Guyra, Glen Innes and Walcha historical societies.

Dot Vickery and Martha Weiderman represented the Guyra and District Historical Society.

The Guyra Museum is currently undergoing exten-

sive renovations which has been the impetus for reorganising the museum's collection. They believe the workshop was valuable and informative.

"For those of us who are looking after the museum it was well timed and extremely helpful," Martha "It has helped us with decisions on how to display to best advantage all the wonderful artifacts that can be faound in the Guyra Historical Museum."

Particpants were provided with support materials and guidance on how to manage their collections, including developing exhibitions, formulating acquisition policies, identifying significant objects and writing labels.

MAAS is Australia's contemporary museum for excellence and innovation in applied arts and sciences. Established in 1879, its venues include Sydney's Powerhouse Museum, the Sydney Observatory and Discovery Centre.

"It's so important for regional communities to have access to skill development in managing and curating their local heritage objects," Armidale Folk Museum Team Leader Hayley Ward said.

"Managing and conserving local heritage is an incredible privilege and it's important that we're looking after these collections for future generations to enjoy."

large adjustments to price levels as the market opened this week, particularly in the finer micron and Merino Carding categories. The Eastern Market Indicator fell 72 cents on the first day of sales and a further 24 cents on the final day. AWEX figures indicate that this was the largest weekly fall in the EMI in 15 years. The sharp falls took their toll on the clearance rates with almost 23% of the national offering passed in, with another 7% withdrawn prior to sale. This resulted in just 25,826 bales being sold for the week. Major buyers included Seatech, Tianyu and Kathaytex. This

week's 12% fall in the Merino Carding indicator has left it as the only category in the negative compared to the corresponding period last season. The price premium for the Superfine types has continued be to eroded as the distinct lack of supply in the mid micron types appears to be holding them in good stead. 75,000 fewer bales have now been offered compared to the corresponding period last season. This equates to around two average size national weekly sales. Forward market prices for the next two months especially for 21 microns are not far under this week's close.
