Huge win for Gun Club

GUYRA Gun Club will now have the firepower to host larger events, upgrading onsite amenities, camping facilities and electricity supply with a \$100,141 grant from the NSW Government.

The financial win will allow the club to construct a new standalone amenities block near the caravan sites. The increased number of powered camping sites will increase the attraction for passing campers to stay in Guyra, not just for travelling shooters but also for grey nomads.

This latest funding comes just a few months after the club was awarded almost \$8,000 from the NSW Government to upgrade its toilet and shower facilities and provide disabled access.

Guyra Gun Club committee member and chief handicapper Greg Brunsdon described the funding as a "huge win in tough times".

"Everyone's ecstatic about it; over the moon, it's absolutely fantastic news," Mr Brunsdon said. "Clubs like ours just don't get this sort of funding often and for us to get a grant of this extent is rare. Usually it revolves around some smaller grants, with

working bees and relying on members with some trades experience to invest their time and expertise so often to help out."

"By offering more facilities we can then attract more shooters to the Guyra area and that will have a flow-on effect," he said.

"Because the gun club is close to the New England Highway, it gives camping opportunities in town outside of the normal shooting calendar"

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that many visiting shooters and their families camp at the club grounds for a number of days and so these facilities are critical to keeping these large events going in the region.

"The Guyra Gun Club has a proud tradition when it comes to shooting – we've had Olympic and Commonwealth shooters like Terry Rumbel come out of this club, and many state and world championship placegetters as well, so we know just what a great breeding ground it is," Mr Marshall said.

"This project will not only improve facilities for them but will bring other benefits to the local community through increased public use of the venue."

The funding comes from round two of the NSW Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund.

Tingha gets cash for upgrades

Tingha will benefit from two State Government grants, recently announced by Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall.

\$114,000 has been allocated to erect shade sails and benches at the Tingha Skatepark and another \$47,250 will go towards an upgrade of amenities at the Tingha Gems caravan park.

Mr Marshall said that the skatepark at Tingha is a magnet for hundreds of young people who live in the village and shade sails over the park and benches will make the facility more userfriendly and encourage greater use of it during summer months.

Armidale Regional Council will manage the project and Mayor Simon Murray has welcomed the funding.

"The skatepark is a valuable hub for young people in Tingha, as a meeting place and somewhere for people to be healthy and active," Cr Murray said. "It will be a much more appealing place to spend time once the new cover is in place, so the NSW

Stronger Country Communities grant was very welcome news."

In addition, funding for the Caravan Park has been made available through the NSW Government's 2018-2019 Crown Reserve Improvement Fund.

Mr Marshall said that the funding will allow for the building of a new communal barbecue

area as well as refresh the existing amenities and make them more appealing.

"The caravan park in Tingha it really is a hidden gem and ideally located as a jump off point to other major destinations such as Copeton Dam, Gwydir River, Green Valley Farm, Inverell Transport Museum as well as enjoying fishing, birdwatching, hiking and fossicking right in Tingha," Mr Marshall said.

"I'm pleased to see the State Government getting g behind Tingha again and helping this park to upgrade facilities and increase revenue in the long term."

Remembrance Day is this Sunday

The Guyra RSL sub-Branch will hold a Remembrance Day ceremony at the Soldiers Memorial Hall in Bradley Street, commencing at 10.55am on Sunday, 11th November.

Everyone who can is urged to attend as a show of respect for all our servicemen and women who have served in all conflicts. Each year on this day, Australians observe one minute's silence at 11.00am in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts.

This year, 11th November marks the 100th anniversary of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914-18) and brings to the fore the centenary of many of the First World War battles in which soldiers from Guyra fought:

Bullecourt,

Messines, Menin Road, Polygon Wood, Broodseinde Ridge, and the muddiest and bloodiest of them all - Passchendaele.

At 11.00am on 11th November, 1918 the guns of the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. The Allied armies had driven the German invaders back, having inflicted heavy defeats upon them especially over the preceding four months.

In November the Germans called for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace settlement. They accepted Allied terms that amounted to unconditional surrender.

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the post-war years. The

moment when hostilities ceased on the Western Front became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war

This first modern world conflict had brought about the mobilisation of over 70 million people and left around 10 million dead, perhaps as many as one-third of them with no known grave. The allied nations chose this day and time for the commemoration of their war dead.

During the period of the First World War, Australia's population was 4 million which is now the population of Sydney. More than 600,000 of our young men signed up to fight for their country and homeland.

Second at Brain Olympia

Tom's speech was well structured and clearly depicted his favourite place which was Australia. After lunch students worked with their teams to prepare a short play based on the story of Little Red Riding Hood. The St

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

October 31st - There was a small increase in lamb numbers, while the sheep supplies almost doubled. The quality of the lambs was very mixed with trade weight crossbreds well supplied. There were limited numbers of heavy weights and new season lambs. Plain condition, light

weight Merino lambs were plentiful. The usual buyers were in attendance. Young lambs to the trade remained firm on the previous sale. Trade weight old lambs sold to a cheaper trend with some quality related price change. Heavy weight old lambs remained firm, however there

were odd pens carrying more weight than the previous sale. The plain condition Merino lambs attracted restocker competition, they were firm to cheaper, but carried little in the way of skin value. The quality and condition of the Merino's to the trade was well below the

previous sale. Plain condition sheep were plentiful, they sold on a firm to cheaper market trend. There were very few well finished sheep available, mostly small numbers in each lot. That market was also firm with odd cheaper sales, some of that being weight related.

Weekly Wool Sales

November 2nd - It was a fairly positive start when sales commenced this week and by the close of the first day many Merino types had gained a handful of cents with the only drag on the market being the Merino Carding indicator.

Sentiment shifted slightly on the final day of selling with most micron indicators recording 15-25 cent losses. The rapid decline in the Merino Carding indicator continued this week with a further 98 cent reduction resulting in a 20% fall in the space of two weeks. 29,390 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 16.7%. Almost one quarter of the oddment offering was passed in this week as prices

have fallen well below the corresponding period last season for these types.

Major buyers included Fox & Lillie, Seatech and Techwool. AWTA test data released yesterday is showing a 9.7% decline in the weight of wool tested nationally with NSW, WA and Tasmania all suffering in excess of a 10% drop in production.

AWEX figures are showing an even more substantial drop of 14.2% in the volume of first hand wool offered for the season to date. Weekly national offerings are expected to be between 35-40000 bales for the next three weeks.

Armidale Cattle Sale

November 1st - Numbers almost doubled, with little follow up rain in the past fortnight. Young cattle and cows were well represented, along with a fair representation of cows and calves, making from \$680 to \$1,150/unit.

The quality of the offering was mixed, with the condition of the young cattle on the lower end of the spectrum. There were a few well finished lots through the older cattle, with some of the cows showing excess coverage. The usual processors attended and local restocker competition was strong, particularly on steers.

Market trends varied through the young cattle, with the localised restocker competition pushing light weight steers to a dearer trend of as much as 30c/kg on the preferred

breeds. There was vast variability in quality and breed through the yearling steers, this accounted for the large price variation. The limited supplies of medium and heavy weight yearling steers suitable to feed also sold to a dearer trend when compared to the sale a fortnight ago.

Conversely, yearling heifers to restock and feed did not attract the same level of competition as the steers, resultin in cheaper trends throughout. 
Sam played Victoria and QLD twice and ended up in a final against the Queenslanders. It was a very close game and unfortunately the NSW girls went down by 1 goal!
