New recruits for LLS

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services (LLS) has welcomed two new members to its Environment Team, further strengthening its proficiency and knowledge base, and setting it up for action with a range of future projects. Anya Salmon and Elsie Baker have recently commenced their roles and look forward to bringing their extensive expertise in working with landholders and stakeholders across the region.

Anya Salmon will be a familiar face to many in the region through her previous role as Executive Officer at Gwymac Landcare in Inverell, where she gained years of valuable experience that she will easily transfer to the new role. The focus of Anya's role with the Environment Team includes the effective liaison between Northern Tablelands LLS and the four Landcare Networks in the region

Anya's support for the Landcare offices will extend through Tenterfield, Glen Innes, Armidale and Inverell and focus initially on projects for which collaboratively, Northern Tablelands



LLS and Landcare have successfully secured funding. Examples of these include the Regent Honeyeater Project, as well as the RAMSAR conservation wetlands project.

Elsie Baker brings a background in natural resource management, particularly bush regeneration, as well as experience in local government planning, to her new role. Elsie is based in Glen Innes and will be responsible for managing events, while also responding to expressions of interest from landholders wanting to access LLS support programs to build the environmental capacity of their farms. The diversity of Elsie's role means that she is also very hands-on with the NSW Catchment Action funded Cool Country Koala Project. The project has contracted the University of the Sunshine Coast to carry out surveying work with their detection dog Baxter in the Northern Tablelands area.

Think safe with Christmas lights

As the festive season fast approaches and the decorations come out of storage, Essential Energy want those who install do-it-yourself Christmas displays to think first about some basic safety checks to prevent electrical incidents.

Acting Regional Manager Northern, Jamie Warren said putting electricity safety measures in place prior to hanging decorations could provide peace of mind for a safe holiday season.

"Ensure the home, garage and workshops are fitted with safety switches such as Residual Current Devices (RCD) or Earth Leakage Circuit Breakers to reduce the likelihood of electric shock," Jamie said.

When installing lights or illuminated decorations, check for damaged or frayed cords prior to use and always follow the installation instructions. Turn off power points or light switches before replacing light bulbs and minimise the use of extension leads when organising the display.

"Be aware of the location of service lines and electrical wiring within the work space when installing Christmas lights or displays on rooftops. Do not cut, drill or hammer into rooftops, walls, floors or ceilings before thoroughly checking for electrical wires," Jamie said.

"Take the opportunity when installing a Christmas light display to educate children of the importance of electrical safety and the danger of damaging electrical equipment. Show family members the location of the main switchboard

in the case of an emergency where the power may need to be disconnected."

"Fit spare outlets on power boards with safety plugs to prevent children placing objects in the sockets; and don't overload power points with more than one adapter. Ultimately, the safety of you and your loved ones will ensure you can enjoy the holiday season with them," Jamie said.

In the event of a suspected electrical shock, do not attempt to touch the person until the power has been disconnected. Provide first aid when it is safe to do so and always seek medical attention afterwards.

Mayor's Message

A number of strategies to enhance and progress Armidale have been taking shape in recent times.

The Armidale CBD Revitalisation plan, Dumarsq Creeklands Master Plan, Car Parking and Mobility Study, Community Services Public Art Policy and Armidale City Activation Plan are among the studies and plans being undertaken to build upon the city's strengths and take it into the next 20 years and beyond. What has become abundantly clear as each strategy has progressed is how interwoven and interdependent these plans are upon one another. To gain the most from these investigations and their outcomes, a more formal connection is needed – to ensure they inform one another and build upon their initiatives.

For this reason, Council is looking to implement an overarching city masterplan, designed to bring all these strategies together.

It is also important the overarching masterplan expands the outlook of each plan to consider how the city services and supports the rest of the Armidale region. How do people in the region's other centres use the city and what changes are needed to better meet their needs?

A review of the existing plans has begun, to identify their synergies, and the city masterplan will gain momentum early in the new year. Development of the masterplan is expected to take about 12 months and will include broad public consultation, designed to encourage

input from all sectors of our community. That includes our young people, residents in the towns and villages, people from non-English speaking backgrounds – so we get a clearer picture of all the community's needs and aspirations.

Follow-up deliberations and consultation scheduled for the supporting plans will work hand in hand with formulation of the masterplan.

That includes finalising plans for the CBD revitalisation. A community advisory group

comprising local business people and other key stakeholders has been busy reviewing the original concept designs, in line with community feedback received at the start of the year.

The group's time and efforts have been extremely valuable, to help forge some fantastic designs that can be considered and intertwined with the initiatives, objectives and styles of the broader masterplan.

Initial investigations for each of these plans have already produced some excellent feedback and ideas. They can only be improved by revisiting each of them and fine tuning them within the context a broader city vision and with the benefit of far-reaching consultation for the masterplan.

Weekly Wool Sales

November 23rd - After the brakes were put on the slide in prices last week the market roared back to life with gains made over both selling days. The largest gains were made in the mid micron Merino types and the Merino Carding indicator which is now up 160 cents over the past fortnight. 28,995 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate of 5.9% dropping well below the seasonal average. Major buyers included Tianyu, PJ Morris and Seatech. As predicted in last week's commentary the **Australian Wool Production** Forecasting Committee increased the expected decline in production for the

national clip. The new forecast for the 2018/19 season is an estimate of a 10.8% decline in production up from 5.7%. The micron profile of the national clip has also changed due to adverse seasonal conditions with an increase in the volume of wool testing 18 micron and finer and up to 40% decreases in wool testing between 20-23 microns. This week's auction market has no doubt partly reacted to the Committees report. Growers who voted in WoolPoll have voted for change, with the 1.5% levy option narrowly being chosen over the current 2% levy.
