Aileen MacDonald was crowned as Guyra's Citizen of the Year at the Australia Day dinner held at the Guyra Bowling and Recreation Club on January 25th. Aileen was recognised for her roles as a member of Council's Regional Growth Committee and past President of the Guyra Business Chamber. She has been a strong advocate for economic development in the Guyra district, including an expansion of the area's horticulture industry.

The awards and community celebrations were coordinated by Armidale Regional Council with Australia Day Ambassador, celebrated rugby commentator Gordon Bray, the guest speaker at Guyra events. Aileen was selected ahead of five other nominees. She was a leading campaigner for the Malpas Dam to Guyra water pipeline and improvements to Mother of Ducks Lagoon, and has sowed the seeds for the proposed New England Rail Trail. Her two terms as President of the Rotary Club of Guyra brought many successes for the club and she served a term as secretary of Rotary District 9650.

Aileen said it was a great honour to be named Citizen of the year and she was humbled by the win.

"Thank you to all the other nominees who were put forward. I would like to congratulate them because without them Guyra wouldn't be what it is today," she said. "My father reminded me that back in 1963 he and my mother decided to emigrate to Australia, and they took up that opportunity because they wanted to have a go. Everyone in Guyra does that for this community, they have a go."

Bronte Stanley was named as the Junior Citizen of the year. In her role as captain of Guyra Central School, she helped to organise a very successful Mental Health Day for the students. She also earned a place at the National Youth Science Forum and excelled in swimming and the arts.

Kath Varley was acknowledged for Longstanding Service to the Guyra community. Her many roles include 10 years as Guyra Show Society Secretary, a foundation member of the Kolora Aged Care Facility committee, Guyra Ladies Golf Club President and Catholic Church Finance Committee member.

Other awards went to Ben Lomond Landcare and Rural Fire Service volunteer Russell Roberts who was awarded for Community Service and local artists Kay Smith and Brian Irving for their contribution to Arts and Culture. The award for Community Event or Group of the Year was Passion on the Platform, organised by the Guyra & District Chamber of Commerce.

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Festival breaks the drought

The Guyra Lamb and Potato Festival is done and dusted for another year. While this year's festival did not break any records, it did break the drought. The arrival of thunderstorms and rain was welcomed by all in the district, but also affected numbers visiting the festival particularly late in the afternoon.

Secretary Julie Gittoes paid tribute to founding member Frank Presnell at the Australia Day ceremony held in conjunction with the festival on Saturday morning.

At 99 Frank still organises all the lambs for the festival, which is a remarkable effort. He describes that first festival as a 'bit of a gypsy turnout'.

"Frank will turn 100 on the 1st June and 33 years ago our festival was conceived in his kitchen and he is still actively involved," Julie said.

"It has grown from a single caravan to what it is today

and the great thing about our festival it that it is still run by volunteers - from the top to the bottom we all work for our beautiful town of Guyra."

"We have used 210 legs of lamb all sliced by Geoff Reeves, and his wife Bertha has peeled, diced and sliced 350 kg of potatoes for potato bake – they are my left and right hand and I couldn't do it without them."

"The lamb is cooked by Anne Thrift and her brother Tim Wall who comes down from Brisbane every year to help with the cooking – they are just some of the volunteers who make the festival happen. "In the gazebo I work with about 420 volunteers from different organisations who give up their time to help," Julie said.

"It is amazing that they keep coming each year, but they are all getting a bit older so I would encourage younger people to think about coming along next year."

"The seasoned lamb dinner and lamb and gravy rolls are still the most popular items on the menu – we can't keep up with the demand, they fly out the window along with our local pies. That is what makes our festival extremely successful – we support Guyra and every bit of the money raised stays here in Guyra."

"It wouldn't be a festival without the support from the stallholders who come along every year and also the people of Guyra who continue to support us – we hope to see you all again in 2020.

Trip down memory lane for oldest residents

The Lamb and Potato Express completed 134 trips during the Festival, carrying 1741 passengers.

Among those riding the train this year were two of Guyra's oldest citizens Frank Presnell and Ted Mulligan.

With a combined age of 202 years they enjoyed the ride with driver Ron Lockyer a the wheel.

Prior to the Festival the train rides were under threat and only recieved the go ahead at the last minute.

The train will not operate again until they have completed paper work which is required by the National Rail Regulator.

The Guyra Historical Society is in the process of applying for accreditation to operate the train, which was previously run by the Antique Machinery Group.

This is expected to happen by around April this year.

Seize the opportunities and never stop dreaming


Gordon Bray AM was kept busy during his visit to the Guyra area in his role as Australia Day Ambassador.

The boys are back fundraising

Four Guyra boys are strapping on their boots and preparing to trek to Black Mountain. The Brazier brothers, Harrison, Angus, Thomas and Hugo, are participating in the Melanoma March 2019.

They are hoping to add to the already impressive amount of money they have raised for research into this disease. In 2017 they raised more than \$25,000 after starting Five Cent Friday, honouring their father Mark who died from the disease in 2016.

Their efforts received widespread recognition and last year they flew to Sydney, filming their story which is being used to promote the 2019 campaign against melanoma.

Melanoma March is the biggest fundraiser for the Melanoma Institute Australia and their aim this year is to reach the \$1M mark.

After returning home from Sydney the boys decided that if they were going to help promote the March they should also do one in their home town. Mum Kathryn agreed anticipating it would be a short walk around town.

"My boys said they wanted to walk 35kms to Armidale

and I have been trying to help them make this happen since September last year," she said. "Last week I was informed by the authorities that it would not be possible and had four very disappointed boys."

They are now planning a shorter 15km walk on March 9th, starting from the Guyra Showground and finishing at Deano's fish farm near Black Mountain. Kathryn and the boys are inviting others to join them either in memory of someone who has lost their fight or are still battling with cancer. The boys have not only lost their father, but also their Pop Gus, Uncle Phil and best mate Greg to different forms of cancer and will be marching for them all.

Kathryn said there is now a lot of planning to do in very little time. The Lions Club have agreed to supply breakfast at the start and the VRA and SES have agreed to be pilot cars and first aid.

"You will see some jars popping up for their five cent donations and very shortly I will add a button to the facebook page where you will be able to register to join us and/or donate," Kathryn said. "If you would like to help and not march I will be trying to also organise a lunch at Deano's using local produce because we have so many fantastic products out there.

"Everything we can do to help find a cure is a bonus and it has become the boys mission and I will stand by them whatever they plan to do."

RFS volunteers kept busy

NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) volunteers have responded to an increased number of incidents in the Northern Tablelands and New England region since Christmas Eve 2018.

NSW RFS Superintendent Chris Wallbridge said 136 new incidents were reported with many incidents receiving multiple 000 calls.

"Hot, dry conditions combined with lightning storms around the districts meant very high to severe fire danger that resulted in increased fire activity," Superintendent Chris Wallbridge said.

"Over 400 RFS volunteers supported by crews from National Parks and Wildlife and State Forests spent up to a week controlling some of these fires in difficult conditions."

Superintendent Chris Wallbridge said these incidents are a reminder of the dedication of NSW RFS volunteers, who give up a lot of their time.

"NSW RFS members are on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, ready to assist in their communities whenever it's needed, many of whom have taken time off work and time away from family to assist in bringing these fires under control" Superintendent Chris Wallbridge said.

"That includes attending not only bush and grass fires, but also motor vehicle accidents, structure fires and other emergencies.

"While we should all be proud of their commitment, the community should also recognise the support of the volunteers' families and employers."

This is a timely reminder for all residents to make sure their bushfire survival plan is current and all occupants know what to do if a fire occurs. Please consider pets and livestock in these plans.

NSW RFS Superintendent Chris Wallbridge urged locals to join the fight and help make a difference in their community by becoming a NSW RFS volunteer.

"We're not only looking for new firefighters but also people who can fill other vital roles, including communications, logistics and catering."

Armidale hospital redevelopment opened

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall was joined by local clinicians, community members and project partners to celebrate the completion of the \$60 million redevelopment of Armidale Rural Referral Hospital.

Mr Marshall formally unveiled a plaque and historical photo of the hospital with Hunter New England Health CEO Michael Di Rienzo, to mark the occasion.

Construction on the project began around two years ago after the State Government committed \$60 million to the hospital in 2015. The new four-storey building was completed last year and now the refurbished of existing hospital buildings has been completed, bring the entire redevelopment to a conclusion.

The redevelopment delivered:

• A brand new and expanded Emergency Department

• Four new operating theatres and procedure room

• A new and expanded Critical Care Unit (Intensive Care Unit)

• A new Medical Inpatient Unit

• A new Central Sterilising Supplies Department • New and improved Day Surgery Unit

• Improved Mortuary Facilities

• New hospital kitchen

• New palliative care rooms

"This redevelopment means that Armidale now has a new emergency department, operating theatres and procedure room, sterilising, department and medical inpatient unit," Mr Marshall said.

"In addition the West Wing Building includes a new critical care unit and day surgery.

"We've also seen beautification upgrades done to the Emergency Department pedestrian access and external areas.

"The staff are excited about the redevelopment finally being complete, as the upgrade has seen huge improvements in the facilities offered here in Armidale.

"This redevelopment is absolutely amazing for Armidale and together with the redevelopment of Inverell Hospital and the push for similar work at Moree and Glen Innes, demonstrates that improved rural health services are firmly on the agenda."

Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

January 23rd - There was a reduction in both sheep and lamb numbers, with scattered storms producing some decent rainfall totals over the past week.

New season lambs were well supplied, while older crossbred lambs were in limited supply. Once again light weight Merino lambs were in fair numbers.

The quality of the young lambs

was good and in condition to suit both processors and restockers. The light weight Merino lambs attracted largely restocker competition, with small numbers of well finished lambs going to processors.

Young lambs sold to dearer trends. Those to restockers, showing a quality improvement, were from \$9 to \$18/head dearer. Many of those went to an opportunity feedlot. Well finished young lambs over 18kg sold to a dearer trend of \$3/head.

Heavy weight lambs were least affected, with some weight related price change. The Merino lambs to restockers saw a firm to slightly cheaper market trend, with both quality and skin

values affecting prices.

There was a good supply of crossbred ewes penned, while light weight Merino ewes were also in good numbers. Well finished sheep in all weight classes sold to a dearer trend. Plain condition sheep to processors sold to cheaper trends. Restocker ewes also sold to cheaper trends.

January 25th - For the fourth sale week in a row the market finished dearer with all Merino and fine XB micron indicators quoted dearer. Broader XB and cardings eased this week.

Buyers continue to search out the better spec lots particularly the sounder lots on offer. As the poor seasonal conditions continue these better lots are becoming harder to source.

Chinese buyers were again dominant with Seatech, Tianyu and Tech Wool the major buyers. Recent figures released from AWEX show an increase in the percentage of Growers filling out the National Wool Declaration (NWD). This increase can only be seen as a positive for the industry. It coincides with stronger demand coming from buyers for declared lots particularly those lots declared as Non Mulesed (NM), Mulesed with Pain Relief (PR), or Ceased Mulesed (CM). This increase in demand has led to more requests from buyers for on-farm audits.

These audits form part of the NWD Integrity Program and is carried out by AWEX. It provides the credibility and confidence in the NWD program for our customers by auditing the accuracy of the information declared. All mobs / properties declared as NM,CM or PR are open for potential audit.

January 24th - Following the trend sales earlier in the week, there was a reduction in numbers. Vealers and yearlings were well supplied. There was a fair supply of cows, however there were limited numbers of well finished grown steers and heifers. It was a very mixed quality offering, and this was reflected in the price change columns. Well bred young cattle stood out, with a number of lines of very well bred light weight vealers and medium and heavy weight yearlings. The usual buyers were in attendance and there was extra restocker competition.

There was high demand and strong restocker competition through the young cattle, focused mainly on those well bred lines. Market trends were dearer for restocker cattle, however feeder steers and heifers saw some quality related price decreases recorded. There was an increase from 70c to 80c in the vealer steers to restockers, however the market trend was 40c/kg dearer. This was mainly from local restockers buoyed by some very useful rainfall. Heifer vealers returning to the paddock also sold to dearer trends, however those to the trade sold to cheaper trends. Light weight yearling steers, very mixed in quality and condition, sold to dearer trends to restockers. The medium and heavy weight steers to feed sold to cheaper trends, with some quality related change. A strong restocker order put some breed specific sales to a higher level. The good quality yearling heifers to feed remained firm, however the lessor quality lots sold firm to cheaper.

Well finished heavy grown steers and heifers saw little change. The cow market was dearer throughout, with the well finished heavy weights improving by up to 20c/kg. The heavy bull market was significantly cheaper.
