111th Show takes the cake

Entertainment for families was a key target for organisers of the 2019 Guyra Show and they were rewarded with one of the best Saturday attendances in recent years.

Show Society President Richard Post said that the Show got off to a bit of slow start on Friday, with the weather playing a part, but more than made up for it on Saturday.

"It looks like we have run a great show in terms of supporter numbers and more importantly we also had a good Show financially," Richard said. "We had a real focus on making it a family friendly event and everything worked well."

"There was a period of about four hours on Saturday that was choc a bloc full of entertainment with the junior farmers' challenge, poddy lamb chase and free rides on the mechanical bull so the kids were kept entertained and mum and dad didn't need to put their hand in pocket," he said.

"Our main attraction was the 'Roof Top Express' and it was great to see that lots of people stayed on, particularly families which is what we wanted."

The Official Opening on Friday was performed by special guest Wendell Sailor who also

stayed on and got involved in a lot of events over the two days.

"Wendell was fantastic and did all the stuff we hoped of him, he presented ribbons, and took part in quite a few of our events and best of all he really connected with the locals," Richard said.

"Before the opening he conducted a footy clinic with 50 or 60 kids and that alone was worth it because he delivered a really powerful message about

bullying and the kids were really taken with him."

The men's cake competition was a major drawcard this year with 35 entries. This is well up on four entries just a few years ago and much of this can be attributed to Richard who aims to get more people actively participating in the Show.

After winning the men's cake section a few years back, he issued a challenge to local men to get into the kitchen and see what they could come up with.

Numbers have continued to grow in this section and the judges were overwhelmed by the sheer volume of entries.

The winner was Neil Paine, with last year's winner Herb McKenzie a close runner up. The announcement was made at the bar after the official opening with a new trophy presented by Wendell Sailor.





Healthy kids are happy kids

Guyra Child and Family Health/Hunter New England Health, in conjunction with Armajun and with support from Armidale Regional Council, will run a FREE 'Healthy Kids Happy Kids' day at the Guyra Library on Wednesday March 13th. The day is to promote good health to kids and families in a fun environment.

They will be offering health screening checks for kids aged between 3-5 years, and are happy to organise developmental checks for younger children. The main focus is to promote healthy eating; the importance of eating fruit and veg, dental/oral hygiene, speech, sensory play, fine and gross motor activities, hearing and ear health, not smoking, drug and alcohol awareness, limited screen time and exercise.

Child and Family Health Nurse Kayla Turnham said they recognise the vital role that development plays in the life of children right through to adulthood and the earlier that developmental issues are noted and assisted, the greater the chance a problem can be corrected and normal development re-established.

"Early intervention can make a huge difference to a child's ongoing abilities and successes," Kayla said.

"Our aim is to screen children for any developmental issues that might need follow up and refer as necessary."

To organise a day like this and make it a success requires community support and they would be happy to hear from people to volunteer on the day to help the day flow smoothly. Volunteers would need a current WWCC number.

"We are excited about our day and we'd love you to come along and help us make this a highlight on the Guyra Calendar for Kids and families this year," Kayla said.

Entertainer Simon Mellor will be there on the day and will sing with the kids and create a song for and with them, so that they can go home singing their 'good health song' that they will have had a part in creating.

Each child will also receive a fun 'take away' bag with goodies promoting positive development. The children can then continue to improve areas of their health without even recognising it.



A record number of vendors offered lambs for sale at the Guyra Saleyards last week in conjunction with the annual Lamb Show and Sale. 110 vendors offered 5590 lambs for sale, with good numbers of show lambs penned.

The Show lambs were judged by Tony Corcoran from Glen Innes. He said the quality of the lambs yarded were outstanding especially given the current dry conditions.

"There was an excellent line up of lambs and the lead pens in each section were on par with the best you would get anywhere," he said.

"It was very close with only a point between the winning pen and the runner up and the vendors should be congratulated for presenting their lambs in top condition under trying circumstances."

The export category was won by Stafford Youman for the third year in a row, with Dugald McEndoe from Glencoe a close second. The winning pen were sold by Davidson Cameron and Co for \$235.



Guyra Sheep & lamb Sale

February 27th - There was a large increase in lamb numbers with the incorporation of the annual show. Sheep supplies were down. The quality of the lambs was quite good, with well finished lambs well supplied. The quality of the plainer condition lambs also showed an improvement. There was a reduced supply of Merino lambs. The usual buyers were in

attendance and armed with extra restocker orders.

Market trends through the young lambs to both the domerstic and export markets experienced little change. Quality variations accounted for most of the price change. The restocker lambs sold to dearer trends with an improvement in the quality. Buyers looking for lambs to fill for-

ward contracts and also finish, whilst hoping for a break in the season. There was a good quality penning of older shorn lambs that attracted increases in price. The heavy and extra heavyweight lambs sold on a firm to dearer trend with a premium for the grand champion pen.

There were limited supplies of well finished sheep available to

processors. They were active on the plainer condition sheep with little in the way of restocker activity on Merino ewes. Market trends were slightly cheaper for the well finished lines, cheaper on the plainer condition sheep with the plainest condition lines showing significant price falls.

Weekly Wool Sales

February 22nd _- It was a strong week for the wool market with large price rises being recorded on the first day of sales. The news that South African wool sales had been cancelled this week due to a Chinese import ban because of an outbreak of FMD certainly appeared to help the Australian wool market. Prices stabilised in Sydney during the final day of sales but signs were evident that they may have overshot the mark. The Western region selling after the Eastern seaboard had closed on Thursday suffered some hefty falls, giving back more than half of

the first days increase. The 21 and 28 micron indicators closed the week at new record highs while the Eastern Market Indicator finished less than 100 cents away for its August 2018 record high. 39,447 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 6.1%. Major buyers included Seatech, Techwool and Tianyu with these three buyers accounting for over 50% of this week's Merino Fleece offering. The strong market this week has caused a surge in next week's quantities which is now estimated to be close to a 50,000 bale national offering.

Armidale Cattle Sale

February 21st - There was a small increase in supply. Cows and vealers made up a large percentage of the offering. There was a fair supply of yearlings. The quality of the vealers was primarily good, but very mixed through the yearlings. Large numbers of cows were at the lower end of the condition spectrum. The usual processor and feedlot orders were in place, while there was a noticeable presence of southern restocker orders. Market trends varied through the young cattle. Light weight steer vealers to restockers sold to a dearer trend, up to 10c/kg, along with some quality related improvement. The medium weights sold to a cheaper trend of as much as 23c/kg. Heifer vealers to restockers attracted increased demand and competition, recording dearer trends of as much as 15c to 20c/kg. Increased competition saw the yearling steers in all weight classes sell to a slightly dearer trend, with quality related price change. Yearling heifers sold to cheaper trends, with the light weights most affected. The well bred lines suitable to feed were least affected, easing 6c to 8c/kg. Too few heavy grown steers or well finished heifers to quote. Despite the large numbers, the light and medium weight cows experienced little, but quality related price change. There was good restocker competition to underpin the market. Well finished cows sold to a dearer trend of as much as 12c/kg.
